TAXATION WITHOUT REPRESENTATION.

The special glory of Young America has been that he is against "Taxation without Representation." It was to vindicate the "everlasting principle" that such taxation is tyranny, that he tossed the British tea into Boston Bay, and threw off "the fetters of the British tyrant." But recent events have made its application by Young America somewhat awkward. The United States can't administer affairs in the Philippines, Porto Rico and Cuba according to this principle, because—so it is asserted—the people of those Islands are not capable of self-government. What are they, then, going to do about it? Shall they give up the Islands? Perish the thought. Shall they allow the people to go free of taxation? Not at all. They are simply taxing the people of these islands. Despatches state that the last act of the President, before going south on his holidays, was to authorize a Customs tariff for Cuba. We know that Porto Rico has been subject to an American tax act detrimental to Canadian trade; and it is stated that the Philippines also, will be compelled by the proud conqueror to submit to such taxation as may be imposed. The fact goes to prove the old saw that it makes all the difference in the world whose ox is gored; and that it is not safe to state our principles too strongly. "Taxation without Representation is tyranny;" the United States are taxing the people of Spanish islands, without representation; ergo the people of the United States are tyrants. This is the present situation according to the reasoning of Young America. But, perhaps, it will not last long. We shall see.

THOSE ROAD MONEY ORDERS.

The Patriot of Saturday evening says: "We are in a position to challenge THE EXAMINER's statement of yesterday that Provincial public money, road orders etc., were freely used to induce the electors of East Prince to vote for Mr. Bell on Wednesday last. We challenge THE EXAMINER for a scintilla of evidence, directly or indirectly, where the Premier of this Province or any person for him spent one dollar in the manner referred to. Come along Mr Examiner, give us the proof. We intend to insist on the proof or a withdrawal of the statement and will return to the question again and again until satisfied."

As THE EXAMINER did not make the ridiculous statement that the Premier had personally spent one dollar by means of road-money orders, there is no reason why we should either retract or prove it. It is nevertheless true that road-money orders were cashed in Charlottetown on the day of the election and on the day immediately after the election—two or three falling into the hands of the same merchants; and, it is true, also, that these road-orders came from the direction in which the Premier of this Province had been canvassing for the Dominion Government candidature. The Patriot demands proof, well knowing that these money-orders are now in the banks, or, perchance, in the hands of the government. But absolute proof is not needed. The fact that THE EXAMINER has made a statement and holds to it is, for the public, sufficient proof that it is true. Our contemporary boasts that it is "in a position to challenge," etc. If it is in a position to challenge, it is in a position to explain. We ask it to inform the public why road money orders from the eastern side of East Prince, have been floating around in December, and also why, contrary to the custom, these orders already bore the stamp of the Public Works Department when they were brought in to be cashed at the stores? A clear and satisfactory explanation is demanded in the interests of the Provincial Government?

If the Patriot should fail to make such an explanation, the opposition in the Legislature may, perhaps, at the next session, have to institute an investigation into the matter? And, by the way, what about Mr. Wise's letter? In justice to THE EXAMINER, whom it contradicted, and to Mr. Wise, whom it misrepresented, it ought to publish that letter. We challenge it to do so.

NOTES AND COMMENTS.

—The Toronto Star, a fairly steady supporter of the Government, tells Sir Wilfrid Laurier to come home, and that he should know by this time that at Washington he is chasing a shadow. There are a good many who think like the Star. But, the Montreal Gazette remarks "There are those who will doubt, however, if the Premier will know when it is time to come home. He has been shadow chasing so long, and has chased so many shadows, that it must be necessary to tell him several times to stop."

—We note in The Guardian an advertisement of one of the largest firms of wine merchants in Montreal. It covers nearly two columns, is well displayed, and sets forth the special merits of a quality of wine which, it says, "braces body and brains." Of course The Guardian has a right to accept Montreal wine merchants advertisements; but if so, by what right does it censure newspapers which advertise the "choice brands" of our local liquor dealers? We fear that The Guardian is, like the rest of us, after the everlasting dollar.

ESTEEMED EXCHANGES.

—St John Sun: Mr Lemieux, one of the government orators who campaigned in Bagot, has since told a Montreal meeting that the argument he used most successfully was one in favor of reciprocity. Unfortunately he did not explain how he presented the case, and how far the election of the Laurier candidate has advanced the prospects of reciprocity.

Halifax Herald: The grits are shouting because the Dutch have taken Holland under very favorable circumstances, that is, because the grits have carried a few grit constituencies at bye-elections. "Oh," they say, "but we also carried Bagot, which was conservative." Well, at the last preceding contest in Bagot, namely at the general election of 1891, Mr. Dupont a very popular man, held his seat there by a little majority of 43. Mr. Dupont is dead; and now the report is that Mr. Marcell, grit, has carried the country against a new man by a small majority of 64. This result could be effected by a change over of only 54 electors—not a very great revolution at a bye-election in a French constituency.

Large American Exports.

NEW YORK, Dec. 17.—The Customs-house returns of the United States exports for the past year show a considerable increase over the preceding one. The total amount will exceed the sixty million mark set by Great Britain.
