TORONTO (CP)—The stock market followed up Tuesday's gains with another, though more patchy, advance Wednesday.

Coppers started in the mining division. **Coast Copper jumped** \$2.50 to a new peak of \$11.10. **Termin continued to roll** adding 65 cents at a high of \$5.40. **Ore new sent Coppereer** turned 20 cents to \$1.85. **Most active issue** was Indian Lake which tumbled over 739,000 shares for a 12-cent advance to 37 cents, as an underwriting option was taken up. **Cop-Per Cliff was the heaviest** losing, dropping 30 cents at \$3.55 on drilling news.

Nesbitt Labine again traded briskly in uranium, dropping 15 cents to \$3.30. **Mentor advanced** to \$1.33. **Gold were dull** but McIntyre added \$1.50 as speculation grew of possible executive changes and revision of company policy.

Merrill Pete, at a high of 15, and Calgary and Edmonton, at 21, each gained a \$1 in western. **Canadian Deviant and Petro** were firm among the lower-priced issues.

N. B. Labor Fed. Urge: Chignecto Canal Project

FREDERICTON (CP)—The New Brunswick Federation of Labor Wednesday urged the provincial government to do everything possible to make the proposed Chignecto canal a reality.

The recommendation was part of the federation's annual submission on proposed legislation. Federation President James A. Whitebone of Saint John, N.B., and executive officers handed it to Labor Minister Arthur E. Skaling here. A canal across the 17-mile Chignecto isthmus connecting Nova Scotia and New Brunswick has long been mooted as a boon for shipping between the Bay of Fundy and St. Lawrence river and Gulf ports.

Further on canals, the brief said "completion of the St. Lawrence waterway will prove disastrous to the economy of New Brunswick."

The federation urged that loans and credit for home building and improvement be broadened.

The Liquor Control Act came under fire with the report that members had been "forced" to purchase certain brands of beer at the "direction" of the liquor control board. A request for local option on liquor sales was renewed.

Subsidy and promotion were felt necessary for the sagging fishing industry, the wage structure for government employees was considered uneven and needed review, the brief said.

NEW YORK (AP)—The recovery movements in the stock market continued for the second session Wednesday.

The market in two days has retraced about one-third of the average loss since the first of the year.

The Associated Press average of 60 stocks was up 90 cents at \$174.70. It advanced \$2.20 Tuesday. At the first of the year the average stood at \$180.20.

The industrial component on the average was up \$1.50, rails were up 50 cents and utilities gained 10 cents.

There were 21 highs and six lows for 1955-56.

Canadian issues were mixed. International Nickel added 3/4 cent and McIntyre gained 1/4. Canadian Pacific and Dome Mines both slipped 1/4 and Hiram Walker and Distillers Seagram both remained unchanged.

On the American stock exchange Lake Shore remained unchanged and Giant Yellowknife fell 1/4.

MONTREAL (CP)—Most issues held on to early gains to close higher at the end of moderately active trading on the Montreal and Canadian stock exchanges Wednesday. Mines were generally improved in active trading.

Papers provided firm ground as International added 2 1/2 points and Donohue a point. Utilities, beverages and banks were mixed and carriers were quiet.

Canadian Locomotive headed the miscellaneous section with a 1 1/2-point advance. Steels, refining oils and base metals were higher.

Mining winners included Indian Lake, Panel, Montgomery, Calgary and Edmonton, East Asbestos and Fibremont. Small slips were seen in Rayrock and Bouscaillette.

Industrial volume was 67,400 shares and mines 1,567,100. Of the 268 issues traded, 89 were up, 67 down and 112 unchanged, with 12 new highs and 3 new lows established for the year.

The stock exchange's closing average showed banks off 0.04 at 50.54, utilities off 0.1 at 134.6, industrials up 0.1 at 285.4, combined up 0.8 at 233.1, papers up 9.61 at 1357.41 and golds up 0.19 at 76.98.

Dunn's Heirs Speculate How To Spend Money

LONDON (CP)—Three of the five children and one grandchild of Sir James Dunn reported in line to share in the late financier's wealth told Wednesday how they plan to spend part of their legacies.

Sir James died in New Brunswick Jan. 1, leaving an estate that has been estimated unofficially at \$40,000,000 after death duties.

According to Montreal reports they plan to spend part of their legacies.

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Published in London newspapers, 50 per cent of the estate will go to Sir James' widow and the rest to his father's heirs.

Sir Philip Dunn, successor to his father's title who now is in Canada, Mrs. Kathleen Adeane, Lady Sherborne, Mrs. Bridget Bromsley; Mrs. Anne Wishart and Mrs. Monica Graham. Mrs. Graham is a grand-daughter whose mother died in 1928.

PLANS TO TRAVEL
"It's a fantastic amount of money," Mrs. Bromsley, 36-year-old wife of a travel agent, told reporters. "A million pounds, you just cannot realize it. I shall travel and travel."

Mrs. Graham, 26-year-old wife of a London car salesman and mother of a 19-month-old daughter, was stunned. She said the windfall "now we may do with the money father left."

Lady Sherborne, whose husband is a prominent British landowner said the family here was a "little amazed" at the amount of money left by Sir James. A flier, Lady Sherborne was the first Canadian to take out a pilot's licence for an autogyro.

Mrs. Adeane, wife of a director of 33 companies, said the money will not change her life.
