

Beavers Defeat Hawks 13-2 To Take Over First Place In League

MONCTON, N.B., Oct. 17 (CP) — Saint John Beavers vaulted into first place in the Maritime Major Hockey League tonight, drubbing Moncton Hawks 13-2.

Playing their third game in three nights, Hawks appeared disorganized against the precision-like attack of the high-scoring Beavers.

Saint John picked up a four-goal lead in the first period, stretched it to 11 in the second and added another pair in the final frame. Hawks did not break into the scoring until the final frame, when they netted their two goals.

Beavers hammered 47 shots at hard-working Jackie Gibson in the Moncton cage. He made some sensational stops but was unequal to the tide of rubber which lapped up to his doorstep.

Buchanan paced the Beaver assault with two goals and two assists. Other Saint John snipers were Meldrum and T. Smelle with a pair each, and Watson, Lee, Arundel, Mulligan, C. Smelle, Ubrico and McCracken with singles.

Laurie Peterson opened the scoring for the Hawks and their other tally was netted by Moose Gallo.

Poulton In 5th Round T.K.O. Over Marlin

Harry "Kid" Poulton, Island middleweight champion scored a fifth round technical knockout over J. Marlin of Charlottetown in an action filled boxing bout at Georgetown last night.

Poulton ended the scrap at 1:46 of the fifth when he sent Marlin to the canvas for an eight count. In the third round Marlin sent Poulton to the deck for an eight count with a blistering right to the head.

The bout was a return match between the two after Poulton had won the first. Last night Poulton weighed 145 lbs. and Marlin 160.

The semi-final bout also provided plenty of action with Johnny Russell winning a decision over Louis "Kid" Lafferty of Charlottetown. Russell weighed 165 lbs. and Lafferty 162.

The bouts were held in the Georgetown rink and attended by a large crowd. They were sponsored by the Georgetown Community Welfare League.

There were three preliminary bouts with Billy Hutch, 130 lbs. of Georgetown winning a decision over Donald MacDonald, 136 lbs. of Georgetown. Paul Batchelder of Georgetown defeated Ray Murphy, also of Georgetown and Terry Solomon and Arthur Gallant fought to a three round draw.

The Middleton Cardinals, intermediate champions of Nova Scotia, and Summerside Holmans, Prince Edward Island champs split a doubleheader at Middleton yesterday in the finals for the Maritime intermediate baseball championship, the Middleton team winning the first by a 8 to 4 score, and the Holman nine coping the second, 7 to 1.

The first game in the Prince Edward Island senior football series between the Abbies and Sains will be played on Memorial Field, Saturday afternoon. It was announced last night by M. E. Campbell of the Abbies. The series will be the best two out of three games.

Chief Justice Thane A. Campbell in his report on the Fifth Confederation Bonselpiel which was held in the week of February 19-24, stated that although the advance registration of entries was light, many visitors and local players judged it to be the best of the Confederation Bonselpiels which they had attended.

He stated that the curling competitions were keenly contested and the mixed curling events which were played on Saturday greatly helped to fill the entry gaps and were fully enjoyed by contestants and spectators.

In giving the financial statement he stated that the balance on hand at Sept. 10th was \$462.82. The treasurer's report showed a deficit of \$162.32 for last season. Mr. Campbell made a number of recommendations the first one being that the Provincial Championship playdowns should be held at the time of the Confederation Bonselpiel.

His second recommendation asked that the Confederation Bonselpiel be expanded to embrace a major bonselpiel in Charlottetown and in Summerside, the Provincial playdowns to be held in the week allotted to each of these clubs in alternate years.

Another stated that the Bonselpiel executive formulate plans for the beginning of this arrangement in 1953 in collaboration with representatives of the clubs concerned. In the meantime he recommended that the Sixth Confederation Bonselpiel be held at Charlottetown in the week of Feb. 18, 1952.

A fifth recommendation stated that in order to avoid further depletion in the club's reserve, the payment to the Charlottetown Curling Club for the Sixth Confederation Bonselpiel should not exceed the actual profits of the Bonselpiel on the other items. His recommendation stated that the mixed events be extended to two days.

Millionaires In 6-4 Overtime Victory Over Charlottetown Islanders

SYDNEY, N.S., Oct. 17 (CP) — Sydney Millionaires shot two overtime goals tonight for a 6-4 victory against Charlottetown Islanders and their first victory in two starts in Maritime Major League play. It was Islanders' second loss in as many starts.

Referee Hugh MacLean and Larry Heffering called a new high in penalties, doling out 26, including a match misconduct to Charlottetown's rearguard Phil Vitale.

Islanders ran the gamut of sharp-eyed refereeing and were assessed 17 penalties to nine for Maritime major hockey's defending champions. Despite the heavy toll, the game was not overly rough and a meek comparison to some of last season's playoff skirmishes between the same two clubs.

A screened shot by defenceman Joe Levandoski set Millionaires up with a 1-0 lead at 7:44 of the first period, but the bluelights failed to make further grade checking in that initial frame.

Bill Cupolo shot two goals on close Sydney drives in this same period but both were recalled, one was kicked behind Gordon and the other planted into the twines with Cupolo standing in the crease.

Islanders took but 25 seconds of the second period to warm into the fray as Charlie Knox drifted a pass from the right boards across the Sydney crease. Centre Willie Marshall, one of Charlottetown's outstanding offensive agents, managed to slash the puck into the net.

With Knox off for holding, Sam Kennedy shot two quick goals for Millionaires and Ron Matthews made it 4-1 at 11:54 with a blistering back-hander.

Then Islanders came back fighting as the Whittlock-Simpson-Smith string struck three times against a weakening Sydney defence.

Whittlock rapped home two and Gord Simpson tied the score at 15:57.

Play bogged down between the two blue lines during the third period.

Islanders had the push but not the breaks in the overtime.

Alex Birukow shot the winning goal at 4:08 of the extra period. Islanders pulled goalie Hal Gordon for a six-man charge at 8:03 but, although they swept within range twice, were kept out of the scoring by net-minder Nick Pidsodny.

Sam Kennedy drew a head from his own blueline into the open Charlottetown net to finish the scoring.

Vitale was given a slashing penalty at 4:08 of the third period but continued badgering of referee Hugh MacLean before he entered the penalty box resulting in an added 10-minute misconduct and a stern warning that continued heckling from the box would put him out of the game. Play was underway for nine seconds and Vitale was still arguing but using no profanity when MacLean stopped play and ordered the big defenceman to the dressing room.
