Triple Crown For Taylor

F. P. TAYLOR, Toronto business tycoon, has had many great accomplishments in life. His greatest achievement has been in recent years and perhaps the most satisfying to himself, haven't been in business though. They have been in horse racing; climaxed this season by the success of his three-year-old, Victoria Park.

Four years ago Taylor's Victoria Park was the first Canadian bred horse to race favorably with the rest of the American three-year-olds. Victoria Park finished third in the Kentucky Derby and second in the Freezakes. Taylor vowed he would win the Derby.

This year, Taylor's "big little horse," Northern Dancer, picked up all the marbles in the Derby and went on to win the Freezakes. Taylor, who probably would have been satisfied to win just the Derby, gets a crack at America's Triple Crown of Racing.

The chances of victory are excellent.

The Dancer won the Kentucky Derby by a neck and captured the Freezakes by 2 1/2 lengths. If he does post at scheduled Saturday, Dancer could win by two or three lengths.

"I actually don't know his capabilities," says the trainer of Northern Dancer, Brian Storer, "but he's doing everything we've asked of him so well that I would hesitate to say just how far he'll go." Jimmy Conway, the trainer of Orientalist, a possible entry Saturday, says Dancer hasn't reached his peak.

Citation Was The Last

THE LAST American Triple Crown champion was Citation. The 1961 winner, a product of the Colmer farm which produced the 41 triple winner Whirlaway, Citation was the most widely acclaimed of all champions.

Citation was a true champion. He won eight of nine starts at two, 19 of 20 at three, and then romped back to the race despite severe leg trouble to gamely establish distinction as those racing's first winner of a million dollars.

The magic figure of \$1,681,790, his triumph in the Hollywood Gold Cup of 1951, his final effort.

From the Kentucky Derby by three and a half lengths and waltzed through the Freezakes by five and a half lengths. In the Belmont, Citation gave his backers a scare by sitting back at the start but he went on to win by the greatest victory. Faraway was closest to Citation in the early running but giving the approach any semblance of a chance to Eddie Arcaro and Citation crossed the wire eight lengths to the good.

There was no question in 1948 about the best horse in racing. If things go as we expect tomorrow, there will be no question as to which is the greatest in 1964. Northern Dancer can be Canada's first Triple Crown winner.

Quadrangle Looking Good For Saturday's Big Race

NEW YORK (AP) — Quadrangle, a powerful Virginia-bred colt from Paul Mellon's rocky stable, gave indications Thursday that he will provide a scare late in Canadian-owned Northern Dancer in the 96th running of the Belmont Stakes Saturday.

The son of Pecos, who'll again tangle with Kentucky Derby and Freezakes winner Northern Dancer, worked five eighths of a mile at muddy Belmont park in 1:10 seconds and went six furlongs in 1:13.25 in his final workout.

The Belmont will be raced at nearby Aqueduct, where the track is rated a trifle slower.

The final leg of racing's triple crown is a demanding 1 1/2 miles. Quadrangle won't be asked to outdistance so easily that some ventured he might throw a scare late in the Canadian-owned Northern Dancer.

Northern Dancer is the only one to become the ninth first since Citation in 1948.
