Mental Health In The Home Is Discussed

Dr. S. R. Laycock spoke with several parent educational groups and health and education officials last night at the home of Mrs. Gordon MacDonald.

He discussed mental health in the home and described sound mental health as: 1. feeling comfortable about ourselves; 2. feeling comfortable about other people; and 3. being able to meet the demands of life.

He said that the three principal agencies in building good mental health are: 1. the home; 2. the school; 3. community (church and other organized groups). However, Dr. Laycock said, the home is the main key to developing emotionally sturdy individuals as the first six years of the child's life is the most impressionable and most important stage in his development as an individual.

In the discussion that followed, Dr. Laycock dealt with many questions on child development asked by the parents. Miss Mona Clay, Guidance Consultant with the Division of Mental Health thanked the speaker for his informative and inspirational talk.

In conclusion, the Mayor made reference to the celebration of the Charlottetown Centennial, pointing out some of the more significant events in the City's history. "There are many events of historic interest in the early days of our City and our Province and I feel very keenly that there is a lack of island history taught in our city and rural schools."

MAYOR STEWART'S ADDRESS

After welcoming the delegates to the city His Worship Mayor Stewart told the teachers, "You are all associated in a great career and have the binding spirit of common purpose in professional education. The therefore, makes your convention one of the most important to be held in our City this year."

"Leadership in education embodies the use of high ideals, honour and devotion as the means of influencing the conduct of those you are destined to lead". His Worship said, "There is no field in which the knowledge of facts and theories, no matter how important, is dwarfed by the influence of example as in the field of education and teaching. You are charged with the command: 'Let your light so shine before men that they may see your good works and glorify your father which is in heaven.'"

"In your profession you have reached a position today by virtue of courage, determination and dedicated faith, to meet new challenges and opportunities. You face responsibilities which you cannot ignore, and you have to exercise the same vigorous, imaginative leadership which has characterized the life of the teacher in the past, to the objective of security for present and future generations - citizens who shall be able to take their place in the everyday life of the community, or adjust themselves to whatever environment in which they may find themselves."

"The teacher who has learned to manage himself or herself has mastered the first principle in the art of leading others, and the teachers must be the leaders if they are to take their proper place in their chosen profession."

"The most important thing teachers can do for their pupils, His Worship added, is to provide the opportunity for their continual improvement in the field of operations under their direction, whereby the pupils will acquire the art of thinking for themselves."

"With leadership comes accomplishment. Leadership does not consist, except in a very slight degree, in telling people how things are done. It is not instruction; but revelation."

"It must be a great satisfaction to you teachers in discovering and developing leadership among the youth, who lives you are privileged to guide. In this changing world, let us never lose sight of the opportunity to develop."

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Judge Tweedy In

Tribute To Late Mr. D. MacKinnon

Warm personal tribute to the memory of the late Mr. Donald MacKinnon, Q.C., was paid by Justice G. J. Tweedy at the opening of the April sitting of the Supreme Court in Summerside yesterday. Judge Tweedy spoke as follows:

"When I presided at the last term of the Court in Prince County it was my sad duty to pay tribute to the memory of the late Judge Lewis. Previously, therefore, it was also my sad duty to make a reference to the passing of the late R. H. Rogers, Q.C."

Once again, at the opening of the Court in Prince County, I feel called upon to pay tribute to the passing of an old and respected member of the Bar of Prince Edward Island - Mr. Donald MacKinnon, Q.C., whose sudden passing we all regret. Mr. MacKinnon was active in the practice of the law and in the Courts of this Province till a few weeks ago.

"It was my privilege to be associated as a next door neighbour to Mr. MacKinnon in the practice of the law for a quarter of a century. I always found him very cooperative and willing to assist the younger lawyers in any way that he could. He was zealous in the defence of his clients, painstaking and thorough in the presentation of their and his viewpoints. Not only in the Courts was he active, but in his Church which he loved so well and in all things pertaining to the good of the community did he take an active part. In his home, too, he will be sorely missed for at heart he was a homey man."

"His passing severs a link with the past for he was truly a lawyer of the old school, having been called to the Bar of this Province on June 24, 1902."

His daughter Suzanne, who not only cared for her father in the home but who was also his secretary, and to his son Lauchlin and his other relatives, I pay this humble tribute on behalf of my fellow colleagues and myself."

Retired Baptist Minister Dies

Dr. Zenas L. Fash, retired Baptist Church clergyman, died yesterday at Moncton.

Mr. Fash was pastor of the Baptist church in Charlottetown from 1909 to 1914, during which time his daughter Erma attended Prince Street School.

He was born at Hampton, N.S., in 1886 and after attending Horton Academy took up his studies at Rochester Theological Seminary, graduating in 1895. Following a succession of pastoral charges which took him to many places in the Maritime Provinces, he spent a few years in Somerset, E.C. He was granted the Degree of Doctor of Divinity by Acadia University in 1937. During his stay at Fredericton, N.B. he was chaplain of the New Brunswick House of Assembly.

in grades one and two, in all provinces but Quebec, will likely get the injections without charge. In Quebec, the plan is to inoculate children of two and three years of age on a limited basis. Of course, parents will be able to have their children inoculated by their own doctors for a fee, providing the vaccine is available from commercial sources.

Officials here said they were sure those who received placebo will get the polio protection this year.

AUGUST PEAK MONTH

All provinces indicated the either have started or are starting the vital inoculations. Canada's polio season usually begins early in the summer, rises to a peak in August and declines rapidly in the autumn.

Mr. Martin said that immunization must therefore be completed before July 1 in order to anticipate a potential epidemic. Previously it had been felt there should be three injections, given over a five-week period, to protect the child or adult against the crippling disease.

STAGGER SHOTS

"At Ann Arbor Tuesday, Dr. Jonas E. Salk, the vaccine developer, urged that only two shots be given over a four-week period and the remaining or booster shot be injected seven months later. He said this would provide greater effectiveness against polio."

Some provinces indicated they will follow Dr. Salk's advice. Others reported they have already started the injections program on a three-in-five weeks basis and that it is too late to change.

"One other problem of deep concern to people who have the education of our young people at heart is the one we studied during Education Week, namely, the recruitment and retention of teachers. "Conditions have been normal in the City during the past month," said Chief of Police MacArthur in his monthly report before the City Council last night. "There has been no serious crime."

Of the 86 arrests made, there were 83 convictions. Fifty-six of these were for being drunk and incapable and seven for being drunk disorderly. Seven motorists were convicted of driving while impaired. There were two convictions for breaking and entering; one for possession of stolen goods and one for theft of goods and money. Seven men were committed to jail for vagrancy.

Money collected for meter and other violations was \$180. Meter permits sold, 36 at \$5.00 each, amounted to \$180. There were 52 bicycle licenses sold at 50c each and 12 dog licenses at \$3.00 each. The total number of telephone complaints received and investigated was 237.
