



### HEADS PROTESTANT FAMILY BUREAU CAMPAIGN

A. James Haslam and J. Fulton Pierce are co-Chairmen. Mrs. J.A. Lawson will direct the Women's organization and R.J. Rupert will be Director of Publicity. Last year in its first appeal a total of \$10,400 was realized and it is interesting to note that the campaign expense was kept

to about 2 per cent of the amount raised. The objective this year is \$12,000 and now that citizens are acquainted with the solid work accomplished by the bureau in the first year of its existence, it is felt that there will be a ready and generous response. Through the Bureau's Field

## Reports Presented At Synod Session Yesterday

The second session of the Maritime Synod of the Presbyterian Church opened in Zion Church yesterday with the celebration of the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper by the new Moderator of Synod, the Rev. T.A.A. Duke, Campbellton, N.B. assisted by the Moderator of the General Assembly, the Rev. Dr. A.D. MacKinnon, Little Narrows, Cape Breton who led in the Eucharistic Prayer.

He asked the Synod to stand behind the work of the Bible Society. The need for support is great. There are many opportunities for distributing Bibles in all parts of the world but in many languages they are in very short supply. In the last few years the overseas mission budget of the major denominations has increased by over 150 per cent whereas the budget of Bible Society has increased only 27 per cent.

Another concern is the lack of suitable leadership, a lack of consistency in leadership. Synod spokesmen are concerned too with the great babble of confused doctrines issuing from Church schools and the number of church schools using non-Presbyterian and non-reformed material. Teenagers need to be assured that they are accepted as a part of the Church. Programs are needed that attempt to interpret the basic truths of the type of security that can be furnished by adult christian leadership.

As is usual at the Synod Holy Communion, the elders who served were chosen to represent the seven Presbyteries within the Bounds, Newfoundland alone being unrepresented. They were: Allan MacKeigan, Marion Bridge, Cape Breton; Gilbert Tattrie, New Glasgow; Pictou Presbytery, W.J. Kane, Halifax; Fred Robinson, Moncton, N.B.; St. John Presbytery, T. W. Foulkes, Campbellton, N. B.; Miramichi Presbytery; Ralph Balderston and Blair MacDonald, Zion and R.S.P. Jardine, St. James, all from Charlottetown.

PRESENTED WITH BIBLE On behalf of the Society Mr. Wheelock presented a Bible, suitably inscribed to the Moderator. The motion of support for the Bible Society which was passed included a reference of congratulations to the Rev. Kenneth MacMillan, the recently appointed General Secretary of the Society in Canada who is also Moderator of the Synod of Toronto and Kingston.

BRINGS GREETINGS Mrs. Macmillan also brought greetings from the annual meeting of the W.M.S. held last week in Sydney. Speaking on the work of missions Rev. Mr. Creaser told a story of opportunity and of some discouragement because the workers are not available to fill the need of the many home mission fields who are without regularmen.

The Synod received warm greetings from the Charlottetown Ministerial Association and from the City of Charlottetown, Rev. Howard Christie, associate pastor of Trinity United Church, brought greetings from the Ministerial Association of which he is president. Our thoughts and our prayers are with you, he said.

Rev. H.M. Creaser, reporting for home and overseas missions, first introduced Mrs. J.A. MacMillan of Charlottetown who reported for the Women's Missionary Society, eastern division in her capacity as vice-president.

It was noted that the Presbyterianism in exploring the possibilities of future development in the Parkdale area here. The report of the Social Service of the church included a report on the Maritime School for Girls at Truro and the Coverdale Home for Women. In the latter case a \$500 grant was readily made available. It was suggested that a film strip showing the work done there so that other parts of Canada might become more aware of the work that is being done. The suggestion was passed over to the audio-visual committee of the Synod for consideration.

Major J.D. Stewart brought greetings from the City of Charlottetown and also on his own behalf as a man "who is proud to be a Presbyterian."

When the Synod had been constituted the representative of the British and Foreign Bible Society, the Rev. Edward Wheelock was the first delegate heard.

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION The report on Christian education indicated an increase of 588 in the Church School bringing the year's total to 10,572. Reports indicated also that there were 389 camps at Camp Geddie during the past summer. On young peoples work it was decided to set up a council, representative of each presbytery, to conduct the business affairs of the conference leaving more times available for discussions and the theme address. Miss Margaret MacNaughton is the National Girls' Work Secretary of the Presbyterian Church.

### Sees Stronger Potato Market

The trend of potato marketings now would seem to indicate that potato prices should improve later in the season, Leo P. McIsaac told the Guardian yesterday. Mr. McIsaac noted that although the price is low now—about a cent a pound—the interest shown by buyers in ordering for future delivery would indicate a stronger price trend later in the season. Mr. McIsaac is the representative here of the Lee Brokerage firm of Toronto. In a few days time they will have a teletype wire service installed that will keep producers and dealers here in close touch with market trends. In this way, he stated, those who deal in potatoes here will be saved the expense of numerous telephone and telegraph charges that normally result when such information has to be procured from Toronto by the individual dealer.

### Well Known Druggist Dies

The death occurred last night at the Charlottetown Hospital of Victor Coyle, well-known city druggist. The late Mr. Coyle was in his seventieth year. A registered pharmacist, the late Mr. Coyle began his profession in this city shortly after the turn of the century. In 1955 he was presented with a plaque by the Pharmaceutical Association in recognition of his fiftieth year of practice.

Deeply interested in sport all his life, the late Mr. Coyle was one of the outstanding city bowlers, and for many years captained the "Alerts", perennial contenders in the Holy Name Bowling League.

During World War One he served as a Staff Sergeant in the Canadian Medical Corps. He is survived by his wife, the former Louise MacDougall. A brother, Charles Coyle, predeceased him on September 16th. Funeral arrangements had not been completed at a late hour last night.

### Will Immunize 22,000 Soldiers

OTTAWA (CP)—Immunization of some 22,000 Canadian soldiers and their dependents in Europe and Canada as a part of an Asian flu began Wednesday, an army spokesman said. Rotation of the 2nd Infantry Brigade in Europe and the 4th Brigade in Canada will begin Friday when some 600 soldiers sail from Rotterdam for home. Anti-flu vaccine has been flown from Canada to the 2nd Brigade in West Germany and vaccination of 11,000 soldiers and their dependents began Wednesday. Members of the 4th Brigade which will soon leave for Europe and their dependents—another 11,000 persons—will also be immunized.

SAINT JOHN, N.B. (CP)—A water shortage in the Spruce Lake system which supplies west Saint John and nearby Lancaster may force a shutdown of the big Irving Pulp and Paper Ltd., mill in Lancaster. City works crews began emergency blasting of beaver dams Tuesday in an effort to raise the lake level, while the mayors of both cities appealed for household conservation of water. At the same time an official of the Irving mill said that only heavy rainfall could prevent a shutdown of the plant. About 450 employees would be directly affected by the closure.
