Leafs Find Scoring Punch in Duff, Armstrong

By BILL MACDOUGALL TORONTO (CP) — Toronto Maple Leafs big game line, out-classed most of the National Hockey League series by a pair of regular scorers in a flashy young centre, has lost its punch.

Leaf chances are fast going to stay that way unless a suitable right winger is found who can click with veteran centre Red Kelly and high-scoring forward Bert Olmstead.

A good chunk of their past glory is fast being usurped by fast-skating centre Dave Keon and veteran wingers Dick Duff and George Armstrong.

Leafs had 32 goals during the season and Kelly 21, his best ever in 13 seasons as a defenceman and forward, for a total of 55. Asorted right wingers added a few more to the line's output.

Colonel Dan mentioned that as a youngster Steele went to California with his father who was training horses in the area.

He returned to P.E.I. and raced horses before taking up residence in Boston. Steele is now a trained and raced throughout Canada.

While racing on the Island one of the stables he handled was that of A. R. Brennan of Summerside. He also raced horses for John P. Smith, a Kingston businessman, and at one time he was owned by these men as now deceased.

DROVE ADA MAC One of the horses his name was also associated with was the mare ADA Mac, a many-time winner on Maritime tracks.

In recent years Mr. Steele drove only occasionally, but enough to keep him listed among the active drivers. He is survived by three sons, Ralph, Victor and John P. Steele and John had been his assistant trainer. A brother, Mac, who was also active in racing game, predeceased him.

When the veteran driver first came to Boston he was active in the amateur phase, then the only kind of racing in the area. He was a member of the Metropolitan Driving Club.
