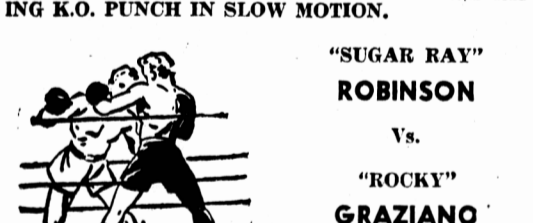

Big Job in India

In 1942, he went to India charged with the task of bringing together all the leaders of Indian opinion, to discuss self-government. The negotiations fell through partly for the reasons that later forced the formation of two countries from one.

Cripps himself however made a lasting impression on the Indian leaders.

He returned to India again in 1946, this time as head of the commission which paved the way for final Indian independence. There had been, as he put it, "a serious deterioration" in Anglo-Indian relations, but he was able to convince the Indians that Britain was sincere in her wishes that the sub-continent become self-governing.

In 1947 Cripps started on his stewardship of Britain's crippled finances as minister for economic affairs, shouldered with the task of co-ordinating the country's efforts for recovery. Later he also became chancellor of the exchequer.
