**ANOTHER SERIOUS OUTBREAK**

**Natives Beaten off By Police and Garrison.**

**Hindoo Village Destroyed and Inhabitants Killed.**

LONDON, Aug. 9.—Another outbreak is officially reported on the Afghan frontier. An attack was made on Saturday and the police and garrison beat off the natives who then burned a Hindoo village and killed some of the inhabitants.

**PRIME MINISTER SHOT.**

**He Falls Dead at the Feet of His Wife.**

**His Assassin an Anarchist Who Gives an Assumed Name.**

MADRID, Aug. 9.—Senor Canovas del Castillo, Prime Minister of Spain, was assassinated on Saturday at Santa Agueda by an anarchist murderer who fired three shots, one of which struck the Premier in the forehead and another in the chest. The wounded man fell dying at the feet of his wife, lingering in agony for an hour and then passing away with the cry of "Long live Spain" which were his last words, upon his lips. The assassin was immediately arrested. He is a Neapolitan and gives the name of Rinaldi, but it is believed that this is an assumed name.

**Administrator for Yukon.**

OTTAWA, Aug. 9.—The Government has decided to appoint an administrator for the Yukon country who will have charge of all the officials there and be chief executive officer for the Government. Major Walsh, of Brockville, is mentioned as the man for the job.

**HORSE RACES AT SHEDIAC,**

**Island Horses and What They Did in the Events.**

**Some Horses Were Pulled, but the Judges Were Powerless.**

SHEDIAC, Aug. 9.—The races at Shediac on Saturday were largely attended and the track was in good condition, though the spectators expressed much dissatisfaction because of the evident pulling of some of the horses, which the judges were powerless to punish, as the track is not in the Association.

The three-minute race was won in straight heats by Honest Tom owned by J. Irving, of Buctouche; Dr. Hall, owned by Mr. Brownell, of Port Elgin, was second; Ben Prophet, owned by Mr. Wilson, of Moncton, third. Lady Parkside, of Summerside, was drawn after finishing an easy second in the first heat. The best time was 2.40 and the purse \$50.

The 2.24 class was won in straight heats by Northport Chief, owned by Mr. Brownell, Port Elgin. Minnie, owned by James McLeod, of S-side, was second, and Flashlight, owned by J. Foster, of Dorchester, third. Best time 2.34; purse \$70.

The 2.29 class was not finished. The starters were Bijou, owned by W. Henderson, of Sussex, Kickapoo, by J. R. Lamy, of Amherst, Gracie Wilkes, by J. Avari, of Shemogue, and Mary Mack, by J. F. Wats n, of St. John. Bijou took the first heat in 2.32 and Kickapoo the second and third in 2.32 and 2.29 and Mary Mack fourth in 2.35. In the fourth heat Kickapoo threw her shoe and the judges gave her time to get it replaced but when the horses were called out Bijou was the only one to respond. It was then dark and May Mack's driver objected to finish the race. The judges found that under the rules they had no power to postpone the race and it was finally decided to divide the purse which was a hundred dollars.

**LATEST NEWS BY WIRE AND MAIL**

PARIS, August 7.—The Gaulois says: "A pigeon bearing news regarding Prof. Andree's balloon expedition across the North Pole, has been captured at Gradisca, near Goritz, 22 miles from Trieste, in Austria Hungary."

SEATTLE, Wn., August 7.—News has just reached here of the death last April of Charles A. Blackstone, Geo. Botcher and J. W. Malingue, miners, who went to Alaska in 1896, and were frozen to death in trying to make their way back to Seattle. They were last seen alive March 27th. Friends from this city, who went to Alaska to investigate, found Blackstone's body, but no trace of the other two could be found. The following statement was found on Blackstone's body: "Saturday April 4th, 1897. This is to certify that Botcher froze to death on Saturday night; J. W. Malingue died on Wednesday afternoon, being badly frozen. C. A. Blackstone had his nose, ears and four fingers on his right hand and two on his left hand frozen an inch back. The storm drove us on before it. It overtook us within an hour of the summit and drove us before it. It drove everything we had over the cliff, except bank t and moose-hides, which we crawled under. Supposed to have been forty degrees below zero. On Friday I started for Salt Water, I don't know how I got there without outfit. On Saturday afternoon I gathered up everything. Have enough grub for ten days, providing bad weather does not set in. Sport was blown over the cliff. I think I can hear him howl once in a while. The bodies of Malingue and Botcher were never found."
