Gorman, BA and Denmark with particular respect to the advanced methods of operation on the smaller many years previous experience scales which might be adopted in the fisheries department particularly as director since 1958, was guest speaker at the weekly luncheon meeting of Rotary held at the Charlottetown Hotel yesterday.

Introduced by chairman, James E. Burdon, the speaker described in highly interesting detail the highlights of a visit to the fishing centres of England.

I saw a water-front display of trawlers reaching more than one and a half miles, chiefly employed on the West Coast of Greenland. "I examined very thoroughly some of the catch brought in by these 170 foot steel trawlers and found the fish in excellent condition", Mr. Gorman stated.

In Norway the speaker was struck with the efficiency in the industry which it gives much prominence in newspapers and referred to "very interesting operations which we could institute here to our advantage."

"Fast steel boats from 70 to 100 feet long dominate the situation," he said. "Small factories are dispersed over large areas and with the long hours of daylight, work is carried on far into the night."

"It was a shock to discover that Canada and the U.S.A. have been literally pushed off the high seas since the war with both countries aware of their problems", Mr. Gorman stated.

ATTITUDES CHANGE
"A change of attitude on the part of both the producer and consumer, to treat fish as a food is behind these advances in England and continental Europe, where fish are kept alive in tanks until ready to be put up in a palatable manner. Equipment, more advanced training in methods at all levels, dominate the situation over there", Mr. Gorman said.

"Starting next year to create a BSC in fishing at Halifax will be our first step towards a vast improvement," the speaker said.

He was thanked by co-chairman, E.D. Reid.

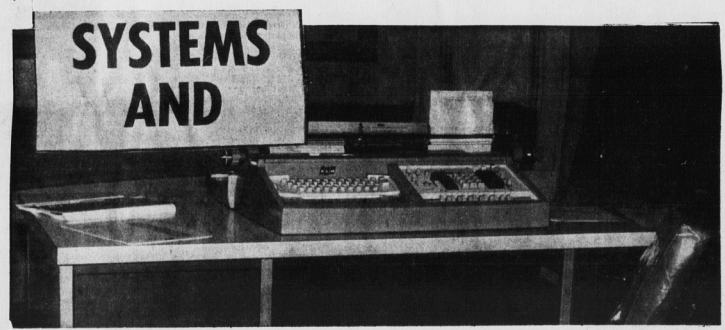

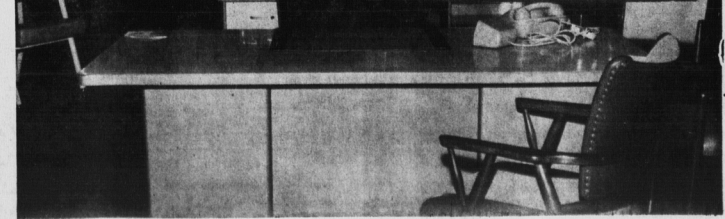
