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Concerned With Information Leaks TOKYO, July 14 - (AP) - American military commanders today said they were concerned about dangerous leaks of military information on the Korean fighting. They said most of these leaks came from the United States. News stories have disclosed secret information ranging from troop movements to the planned use of new weapons in the campaign. So far, no formal censorship has been applied in the field such as the military censorship applied during the Second World War but the clamp-down on information is growing tighter. This long has been expected here because military campaigns cannot be conducted with advance advertising.

BLACKOUT AT MONTAGUE - Montague was plunged into darkness about 9 P. M. Saturday night when a car travelling rapidly snapped off an electric light pole on the Commercial Road about half a mile from the town. Although the town was crowded with the influx from the country, and there was heavy traffic the mile length of the street, no accidents occurred owing to the vigilance of motorists and pedestrians. The usual business was carried on with the aid of lamps and candles, however the theatre was forced to close and postpone the showing of the picture to a further date. At approximately 10:30 the lights were back on and conditions back to normal. On Sunday morning, the Maritime Electric, Montague, replaced the pole.

NEW CLASSROOM FOR MONTAGUE SCHOOL - Work is now underway to construct the new classroom in the basement of the Montague school. The new room will be placed between the two end rooms and will be equal in size to the two end rooms. This will provide the lighting. After having been studded, the room will be completed with ten-test and painted. Mr. Henry Munroe, contractor, is doing an excellent job, and expects to have the work completed in the near future. As an addition another window has been added to the grade eleven room on the north side. Magistrate's Court Hel! At Georgetown

Stipendiary Magistrate for King's County, Joseph W. MacDonald held his weekly court in the Court House in Georgetown on Friday, July 14th at 2:00 p.m. The first case involved a resident of Little Pond who was charged under Section 222-B of the Criminal Code of Canada and amendments thereto: "With having created a disturbance in a public place." The offence took place at St. Georges, some days ago, at a dance. At a previous court another party was fined a similar amount for a like offence at the same place. The accused on Friday pleaded guilty and was fined \$50.00 and costs of \$12.00; in default of payment to serve two months in King's County Jail at Georgetown.

A common assault case, which involved two King's County residents and which had been several times postponed, was withdrawn and settlement made by each party paying half of the costs. A resident of Mitchell River was charged under Section 36 (2) of the Temperance Act, with being intoxicated in a public place. This incident took place in Georgetown and the accused was remanded to jail by a local justice of the peace a few days ago, to await trial on Friday. In this case the accused pleaded guilty and was fined \$20.00 and costs of \$8.50, and in default of payment to serve 30 days in jail.

Court was adjourned to Friday, July 21st.
