Supreme Court, Prince County.

NO CRIMINAL CASES.

SUMMERSIDE, Oct. 6.

THE Supreme Court met this forenoon, Judge Hensley presiding. The following gentlemen compose the Grand Jury: John Gaffney, Esq., Foreman; William Stewart, Thos. Andrews, James Kilbride, Herbert Mills, William Simpson, T. C. Canning, John Auld, Elijah Schurman, James Higgins, V. S. Gillis, Arch. McDougall, D. Smith, Rufus Craswell, John P. Donald, Ed. Moreshead, Hiram Trueman, Thos. Townsend, Alex. Anderson, Thomas Rogers.

There being no criminal cases, the Judge dismissed the Grand Jury at noon. Civil cases come on to-morrow.

Shipping at Summerside.

SUMMERSIDE, Oct. 6.

The harbor here presents an unusually gay appearance, quite a number of vessels being here to load. Already there has been a considerable quantity of produce shipped. David Rogers, Esq., has loaded the barquentine B. L. Page with a cargo of 11,750 bushels oats and 54 sheep, representing a value of \$4,916. She sailed for Demerara on the 1st inst. The same gentleman has also loaded the schr. Elsie G. with a cargo of 8,500 bushels oats and 60 sheep, the value being \$3,500. She sailed for Barbadoes on the 1st inst.

On the 3rd inst., R. T. Holman, Esq., finished loading the schr. Effie Sweet. She had a cargo of 12,884 bushels oats, valued at \$5,749. She sailed for Barbadoes.

M. & A. M. Wright sent the schr. Beatrice to Demerara on the 1st inst. with a cargo of 10,040 bush oats, valued at \$3,449.

Other vessels are nearly finished loading, which will be reported in due time.

Boston Markets.

BOSTON, Oct. 4.

FISH—Receipts of Mackerel at Boston for the week foot up 6,688 brls. of which 4,757 brls. were from the fleet and outports, and 1,931 brls. from foreign ports. The fleet landed 13,402 brls at all ports for the week against 8,598 brls last week and 84,327 brls for the corresponding week last year. The total New England catch up to date 272,305 brls against 354,025 brls for the same time last year, a decrease of 71,720 brls. Although trade is dropping off a little, the tendency of prices of Mackerel is upward, and sales in cargo lots indicate an advance of fully 50 cents per brl. Sales out of pickle have been made at \$7 and \$7.37½ per brl. with barrel, and inspected lots rule at \$4.50 and \$4.75 for No. 3, \$6.50 and \$6.75 for No. 2, and \$15 and \$16 for No. 1. Separate lots of late caught No. 3 command \$4.50 and \$5, and No. 1, \$19 and \$20 per brl. No. 2 range from \$7.50 and \$9 per brl., as to quality. Nova Scotia No. 3 are quiet at \$5.50 and \$6 per brl., with very few offerings. Several lots of P. E. Island Mackerel have been sold, but it is impossible to give a reliable range of quotations, as the quality of each varies considerably.

EGGS.—The market is firm at the advance noticed early in the week. Sales of Eastern extras at 22c per dozen, New York and Vermont at 20½ and 21c, and P. E. Island and Nova Scotia at 20½ and 21c per dozen.

POTATOES.—The market for potatoes is steady, with sales of Aroostook Rose at 50 and 53c, other Eastern at 45 and 48c, and Northern at 35 and 45c per bushel.

The Question of Reciprocity.

(Montreal Gazette.)

The pivot upon which a reciprocity treaty between Canada and the United States must turn is the free interchange of fish between the two countries. The Boston Fish bureau, perhaps the leading authority in the neighboring Republic, has issued a circular pointing out the advantages accruing to the people of the United States from a free import of Canadian fish, and the impossibility of supplying the American market from the product of the sea fisheries of that country, and there appears to be a consensus of opinion that the Canadian fisheries are absolutely essential to the cheap and ready supply of fish food in the United States. A very brief time will suffice to determine the character of the commercial relations between the two countries in the immediate future. President Cleveland, on behalf of his Government, has given a pledge that the fullest measure of reciprocal trade with Canada will be entered upon by the United States, and on its part the Canadian Government has expressed a similar inclination. The one difficulty is in the conclusion of details satisfactory to the Congress of the United States, whose members are in no senses bound by the act of the executive. Investigating Irish Wants.

Lord Randolph Churchill has been at Dublin castle, enquiring into the condition of Ireland and the wants of its people. He will lay the results of the investigations before the Cabinet, and it is expected will propose some measures of relief more in consonance with the wishes of the people than have hitherto been adopted. Lord Churchill spent several hours with the Lord-Lieutenant, who, at the Cabinet's request, has ordered an immediate return to be made of the number of evictions and cases of boycotting which have taken place before and since the recent change of ministry.

Salaries of the British Cabinet.

The salaries of the British cabinet are: Secretary of Foreign Affairs and Lord of the Treasury, \$50,000; Chancellor of the Exchequer, \$25,000; Lord High Chancellor, \$50,000; Lord Lieutenant of Ireland, \$100,000; Lord President of Privy Council, \$20,000; Secretary for Colonies, \$25,000; Home Secretary, \$25,000; Secretary of War, \$25,000; Secretary of India, \$25,000; First Lord of the Admiralty, \$22,500; Lord Chancellor of Ireland, \$30,000; President Board of Trade, \$10,000.

The Plague of Rats.

Amnednugar, in Bombay, is afflicted by a plague of rats. Rewards were offered for the destruction of the pests, but after nearly two million had been killed, the people recognized in the rodents the spirits of their friends who perished in the last great famine, and refused to permit any more of them to be killed.

A Happy Family.

"Woe to Sir John who would not have Riel hanged in 1871," yell the Ontario Grits "Woe to Sir John if Riel is hanged this time," now cry our excellent Rouges. Just imagine this political menagerie, getting into power!

Two prisoners escaped from Sheriff Girouard and his deputy, of Kent County, at Rockland Station, on the 5th inst. They were sentenced to two and seven years, respectively, in the Dorchester penitentiary. As the train neared Rockland Station, they requested permission to visit the water closet, and being shackled together the Sheriff apprehended no danger of their escape. As the train slackened speed they managed by some means to crawl out of the window and made their escape. The Sheriff and deputy are scouring the neighborhood in search of them.

The municipal census places the population of Toronto at 111,800, an increase during the year of 7,524. The assessment upon which the taxation of the next year will be based reaches \$72,721,500, an increase of about three and a half millions on the figures for 1884. Since 1879 the assessed value of property in Toronto has run up no less than \$23,000,000, while from 1873 to 1879, it increased only \$6,000,900.

The Governor General arrived at end of C. P. R. track on the 5th inst. He travelled the last 47 miles by road, camps having been arranged by the C. P. R. company. The weather is very fine and the scenery from the ascent of the Rocky Mountains to Eagle Pass is magnificent throughout. Work on the gap is making rapid progress.

Prince and Princess William of Prussia are going to England toward the end of October for a month, and will be the guests of the Prince and Princess of Wales at Sandringham, afterward visiting Prince and Princess Christian at Cumberland Lodge.

The Kildisart branch of the League continues to boycott Mrs. Morgan O'Connell, niece of Daniel O'Connell, with the utmost severity. She is refused even the necessities of life, and persons seen speaking to her servants are also boycotted.

The Gazette des Hopiteaux describes the case of a woman who drank a pint of kerosene. The dose nearly killed her, and she was saved only after great suffering and an active and severe treatment prolonged for ten days.
