TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.

DOMINION PARLIAMENT

Summary of Proceedings.

OTTAWA, April 10. The Speaker took the chair at three o'clock.

Three Government bills were introduced to-day, these being to amend the Indian Advancement Act, to amend the Inland Revenue Act, and to extend the modus vivendi.

The second reading of the Criminal Law Amendment Bill, which has been twice reported since introduced, was moved by Sir John Thompson, who briefly explained its provisions. The bill was adopted in committee, with the exception of a few clauses of little general interest, reserved for further consideration.

A bill from the Senate, further amending the Steamboat Inspection Act, was read a second time.

A bill from the Senate, respecting agricultural fertilizers, was read a third time and passed.

The House adjourned at 12.25 a. m.

Anti-Carlist Demonstration.

RIOTING.

MADRID, April 10. The arrival of the Carlist Leader, the Marquis of Curalba, at Valencia to-day, was made the occasion of an anti-Carlist demonstration. Thousands of anti-Carlists followed the Marquis to the hotel. The crowd smashed many windows of the hotel and tried to set fire to the building. The troops charged and dispersed the mob, and many persons were injured. A mob of 3,000 people invaded the Carlist Club and set fire to the furniture. Another mob tried to burn a church but were prevented by the troops, who failed to disperse the constantly gathering crowds. The latter built two barricades in the streets. The military authorities have taken possession of the city. The whole garrison is under arms.

Nova Scotia News.

HALIFAX, April 10. Rev. Robert Laing has resigned the pastorate of St. Matthew's Church, and accepted a position as Secretary and Manager of the Halifax Ladies' College.

The original copy of the electoral list alleged to be lost by Sheriff Morse, of Annapolis, has been found.

Israel Longworth, Mayor of Truro, barrister and a prominent stock raiser, has been nominated by the Colchester Liberal-Conservatives to contest the County at the ensuing local election.

Political Demonstration.

MONTREAL, April 8. The Leblanc demonstration at St. Vincent de Paul was a magnificent success, and in fact the current is setting in so strongly against the Mercier Government in this district that even the Minister's supporters, while they hope to hold their own in Quebec district, admit that Taillon will sweep Montreal district.

The Wimbledon Team.

OTTAWA, April 10. The secretary of the National Rifle Association cabled to-day that the new range at Bisley will not be ready until July 14th. Accordingly, the despatch of the Canadian team is postponed for one week, sailing for Quebec on June 19th, by the Parisian.

Separate Schools.

TORONTO, April 10. Archbishop Cleary, of Kingston, has issued a circular to the priests of the diocese in which he threatens, with the heaviest penalties, those who refuse to declare themselves separate school supporters where there are separate schools.

TORONTO, April 11.—10 a. m. Westerly winds, fair weather, not much change in temperature.

Firewardens Meeting.

A regular meeting of the Board of Firewardens was held last evening, Chief Engineer Large presiding. There was a fair attendance of members.

Edward Davy, chairman of the committee on salaries for the current year, presented on evening.

The following salaries: Chief Engineer, \$120 00; Clerk's salary, 100 00; and Keeper of Engine, Fireman, and Hose, 450 00; Silsby and Rollo Engine and Hose, 150 00; Maintenance of Engines, 140 00; Gas, 75 00; Fuel, 30 00; Shoeing horses, 60 00; Allowance to Companies, 210 00; Use of Telephone, 65 00. Total, \$1,800 00.

After some discussion on a petition from the firemen asking for an increase of pay, the following resolution, moved by Mr. William Taylor, and seconded by Mr. William Murray, was carried unanimously:

Resolved, That the following fire companies receive an increase of salary as follows: Rollo Engine Co., \$100; Silsby, \$100; Hook and Ladder, \$50; Savage Corps, \$50.

On motion of Mr. William Taylor, seconded by Mr. Ewen McDougall, the estimates as amended, making \$2,800, were adopted.

After the transaction of some other business the meeting adjourned.
