A ROME despatch says a prelate starts next week on a confidential mission from the Pope to Ireland, to report the true state of affairs. The Catholic bishops in America are specially instructed to exhort their flocks to abstain from any action calculated to promote civil war in Ireland.

SILVER MINE DISCOVERY.—The St. John "Evening News" says that Rev. Mr. Hickson, of Carleton, in company with his brother of Bathurst, and another gentleman have formed a company to open up a silver and lead mine in the vicinity of Bathurst. An assay has been taken of the ore, and it has been found to contain one-third lead of the entire bulk and thirty-one ounces of silver to the ton of lead. Steps are already being taken to incorporate a company to be known as the Nigadoo Silver Mining Co. The capital announced is \$150,000, of which \$50,000 is open to the public. Little doubt can be entertained but that the rev. gold-hunters have struck a rich lead.

A FEARFUL accident occurred on the Morelos Railway, Mexico, on the 26th inst., by which 205 persons were killed and 150 wounded. A train carrying a battalion of soldiers attempted to cross a bridge on the San Antonio River, when the construction gave away and the entire train was precipitated down a steep embankment. Part of the train consisted of freight cars loaded with alcohol. This set fire to the entire mass of wreckage and everything was consumed. One hundred and ninety-two privates and thirteen officers are known to be either killed outright or slowly roasted to death; fifty other persons were either fatally or seriously injured. The bridge was known to be unsafe but was, nevertheless, continued in use. The road is a narrow gauge, built entirely by Mexican capital, and was first opened to the public on the 15th inst.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

GREAT BRITAIN AND IRELAND.
 LONDON, June 27.
 The troops now in the County of Cork are estimated at 5,000.
 The Times says it is believed a Cabinet meeting on Saturday decided to ask the Commons to proceed with the Land Bill from day to day. Gladstone will probably suggest the course to-day. If the proposal meets, as we anticipate, general assent, the committee of the whole on the bill will sit five days a week until the clauses are finished.
 The Standard says the Cornell crew do not seem to have a great pull. Their style is certainly not calculated for lasting, but as they will compete with crews who will have already rowed a hard race, their short quick stroke, and fine condition, may make them dangerous opponents.
 The Army and Navy Club, by ballot, has decided by a vote of 359 to 38 to re-admit Col. Valentine Baker (Baker Pasha) to membership.
 The Standard says that as the time limited by the rules of the Henley regatta for the lodging of objections has elapsed, it may be taken for granted that the Cornell crew will start.
 Deaths are announced of Edmund Beales, political reformer, and formerly president of the Reform League, and John Joyce, Liberal member of Parliament for Durham.
 The Cornell crew has drawn the worst station on the river, as there is a sharp bend in the Henley course and this is always considered to make a material difference of chance for winning.

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EUROPE AND THE EAST.

PARIS, June 27.
 A four-handed billiard match at cushion caroms, between Vignaux and Garnier against Piot and Slosson, was played here yesterday for 5,000 francs, 600 points. The first two won. Score: 600 to 577. There were 98 innings for each player.
 On Sunday afternoon Versailles was startled by the arrival of a deputation of Irish and Irish Americans from here to do honor to the memory of General H. C. He, and to make an anti-English manifestation. Among the number were James Stephens, Patrick Egan, of the Land League, Gen. McAdams, and the Rev. Mr. Pepper, of Ohio. After depositing wreaths at the foot of Hoche's statue as a tribute of grateful Ireland, and after listening to a stirring poetic denunciation of the Sassenach from the pen of the young French poet, M. Robert, the deputation withdrew, leaving the guardian of the place and the French by-standers plunged in astonishment.

PARIS, June 27.
 The death is announced of the French statesman Jules Armand Stouffas du Faure, life Senator and Member of the Academy, aged 83.

UNITED STATES.

NEW YORK, June 27.
 The yacht Anna was sunk in Hell Gate last evening by steamer Adelphi. Four yachtsmen were rescued with difficulty.

WASHINGTON, June 27.
 A thunderstorm of unprecedented fury swept over this city to-night, lasting about an hour. Ford's Opera House, the City Hall building and a large number of residences were unroofed. Shade trees were prostrated and considerable damage done to telegraph wires. No loss of life is reported.

NEW YORK, June 27.
 An Albany special to the Post says there seems to be a general impression that an election of Senators will take place this week. State Senators and members of Assembly, as they return, are more inclined than heretofore to talk of combinations to end the struggle and adjourn.
