## LET'S EAT

### Gay Nineties Palates Favored Fancy Pudding

"I am reading a fascinating book about an era in this country called the 'Gay Nineties,'" observed the Chef. "What dessert was the most popular at that time?"

"A general favorite," I explained, "was called Queen of Puddings, a sort of glorified bread crumb pudding, served warm. It was puffy, layered with jam and swirled with meringue. It was wonderful to look at, wonderful to taste and, also, a good way to 'eat milk' to help get the quota we need."

"Queen of Puddings: Stir 2 c. fine stale white bread crumbs into 4 c. milk; let stand 10 min. Meanwhile, cream 2 tsp. butter or margarine. Blend in 1 c. sugar, 1 tsp. grated lemon rind and 1/4 tsp. salt. Separate 4 eggs. Beat and add the yolks. Stir in 1/2 tsp. baking soda and 1 tsp. lemon juice. Transfer to a buttered or 2 qt. shallow baking dish. Bake in a slow oven, 325 degrees about 1 hr., or until a knife inserted in the centre comes out clean. Remove from the oven. Spread 1/2 c. jam (any kind) over the top. Beat the four egg whites stiff.

**OATMEAL COOKIES**  
1/2 cup butter  
1/2 cup lard  
1-3 cups brown sugar  
1 egg  
1 1/4 cup oatmeal  
1 cup cocoanut  
2 tps. baking powder  
1/4 tsp. baking soda  
1/2 tsp. salt  
Drop on sheet, press down with fork. Bake 10 to 15 minutes in 350 degrees oven.

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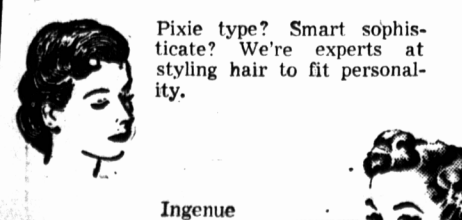
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
