

# Baseball Trades, Firings Highlight Big Weekend

Cardinals traded southpaw Ray Sadecki to San Francisco Giants for outfielder-first baseman Orlando Cepeda-Sunda.

The Cardinals said there were no other considerations in the deal.

The weak-hitting Cardinals were known to have been searching for a player to bolster their attack.

Chub Feenes, San Francisco general manager, said the Giants were in need of a southpaw pitcher and felt Sadecki, 25, can help.

Cepeda has been bothered with knee trouble and now is hitting .267.

Sadecki was a 20-game winner in 1964 when the Cardinals won the National League pennant and World Series but had a disastrous 1965 season, slipping to 6-15.

Sadecki, however, has pitched well in the early weeks of this season, compiling a 2-1 record in five games with a solid 2.25 earned run average.

Cepeda, 29, has supplied power for the Giants with three homers and 13 runs batted in. He led league in homers, with 46, and runs batted in, with 142, while hitting .311 in 1961. But he has tailed off each year since.

He underwent an operation for removal of cartilage last year and appeared in only 33 games, hitting a woeful 176 with just one homer and five RBI.

manager of the American League's last-place New York Yankees Saturday night and general manager Ralph Houk took over direction of the club.

Houk, who had led the Yanks to three straight pennants before moving upstairs, made the announcement in his hotel suite just before the Yanks took the field against California Angels. The decision was made, Houk said, by Yankee president Dag Topping. Houk, who managed the club against California,

paced nervously as he made the announcement.

Houk said he hated to fire Keane.

"I don't want to call him a failure, but something had to be done," Houk said. "Keane is my man. I don't believe he failed."

Also out is first base coach Vern Benson.

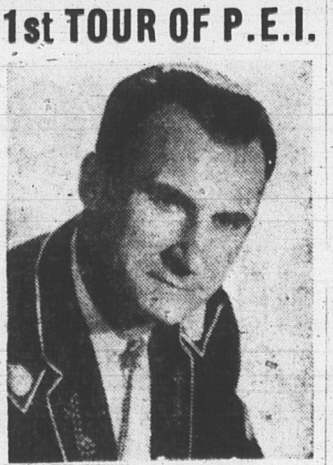
