

# Capitals Down Islanders 6-3

FREDERICTON (CP) — A 3-0 lead going into the second period proved the winning margin Tuesday night as cellar-dwelling Fredericton Capitals stopped the loquacious Charlottetown Islanders 6-3 in an Atlantic Coast Senior Hockey League game.

Fourteen points separate the teams. The other two clubs in the circuit were idle.

It was a sort of revenge for caps, drubbed 8-1 by Islanders Monday night.

Dough Hewey, Bernie MacDonald and Ralph Miles shot the first period tally before Orin Carver counted for Charlottetown in the second. A brace by Bob Leger then gave Fredericton a 5-1 lead.

## Cohen To Defend Title March 5

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa (AP)—World bantamweight champion Robert Cohen of France Tuesday agreed to defend his title here March 5 against Willie Towel of South Africa.

Cohen still claims the world title although the National Boxing Association of the United States recently declared it vacant because Cohen had not met Raton Macias of Mexico.

Cohen and his manager, Gaston Charles Raymond, said it was a mistake that Cohen had until March to defend the crown.

Towel is a brother of Vic Towel, former world bantamweight champion.

## Court Has Boxer Turned Woman Case To Consider

MANNHEIM, Germany (Reuters)—A one-time German navy boxer who now is a woman will be told Feb. 1 whether she can publish her autobiography.

A court of three judges declared Tuesday they will rule then on the sex-change revelation, which is being opposed by the woman's former wife.

Mrs. Hertha Elizabeth Wind, 57, who was known as seaman Adolf Wind during the First World War, appeared in court Tuesday with neatly-applied make-up, a black coat with fur trimming and a chic black-and-white hat.

**WANTS BOOK BANNED**  
His former wife, who has used her maiden name of Elizabeth Glick, after she divorced her in 1977, won't let make-up than her former husband when she appeared to ask that the two-volume autobiography, describing the sex change, should be banned because it transgresses on her privacy.

The judges, a stern-faced, grey-haired woman, who presided, and two men, heard legal arguments for both sides, but did not call the two men.

During the 45-minute hearing, the former husband's lawyer said his client was put in an asylum in 1933 on the testimony of a friend of the former wife and other persons. Publication of the autobiography would rehabilitate her from the moral injury she suffered during her months in the asylum, he said.

Mrs. Wind, whose naval career was highlighted by being voted one of the finest specimens of masculinity aboard his battleship, the Friedrich Der Grosse, began to look at things "through a woman's eyes" after an attack of sciatica in 1928—six years after the marriage.

His muscular body began to soften and assume a feminine appearance. On medical advice, he underwent a series of sex-change operations.

His children learned to call him "Auntie." They could not call him "Mama" and "Daddy" did not seem to fit.

Now that the holiday season is over and things are finally getting back to normal to us, there seems to be a new air of importance to each and every point that a team can pick up in the Atlantic Coast Senior Hockey League. A point here and a point there seems to mean so much more than they did in the first half of the season that one can truthfully say that most of the players in the newly formed league are out there and really putting up an effort to win the game for their club, their coach and also to protect the prestige of its home-town as a hockey town.

Again, the new look on the teams may be because the clubs and the individual players themselves realize that no more strength in the form of new players is likely and that if they don't prove to be a winning team, fans will drop off and the possibilities of the league becoming greater and therefore the chances of players holding their jobs much less. However, in some very distinct instances there seems to be no end to the number of players a single club can import in the run of a season and as far as a deadline for buying in players is concerned, there is evidently none. Earlier in the year there was a great deal of talk around the circuit that if a team didn't have all its players by December 15 that they would have no further chance to acquire them.

The big day, which one would conclude was the deadline for bringing in players, came and everyone, including some of the teams, were under the impression that a team could bring in no more players except in the case where a man had to be replaced because of injuries. They were soon to be informed that conditions were otherwise.

Everyone but the Islanders have been brought in players. The Fredericton Capitals have turned up with Lucien Gilbert, a high-scoring right-winger from the Maine Red Rocks of last season and Guy who, when playing around the opposing net, reminded the writer much of Claude Robert who performed with the Islanders last year. The Amherst Ramblers have added forwards Paul Sandin and Jackie Leduc, defenceman Maurice (Moe) Parr and have shuffled their goal-tenders several times. Then, last but not least, there is the long story of the additions and subtractions made to Moncton Hawks line-up, some of which we have reason to believe are not yet complete. Since December 5, the date after which the referees were supposed to check all players cards before the start of each game, Moncton coach Duggar McNeill has used 21 men in his line-up. He has taken in three pros in the form of Lorne Waters, Bill Simmet and Tod Campeau and then another chap whose status isn't quite clear, defenceman Paul Emile Michelin. However we have come to the conclusion that the Hawks must have gotten their wires crossed and taken Michelin in on a three-game try-out as they so often do in the National Hockey League, because the speedy Frenchman was ousted from the Hawks line-up as quickly as he entered it and where he went, nobody knows. The Hawks are expected to lose Ross Watson in their line-up against the Islanders in the Hub City tonight. It will be Ross's first 1955 appearance in the Maritimes. Both Vip Palladina and Danny O'Connor will be back for the Islanders. With all the shifts the Moncton birds have found possible to make, all it has seemed to give them is a little more variety in their line-ups from night to night in the form of a new face or two.

We had the best laugh of the year last evening when we learned that both the Hawks and the Islanders had been heavily fined for the incident late in the game between the Hawks and the Islanders on Saturday night. The writer had the pleasure of seeing the game and will admit that it was by far the best game we have witnessed yet this year. Owner Bob Carpenter said Tuesday that even the departure of Philadelphia Athletics for Kansas City, which makes Philadelphia a one-club town, won't change the ink in the ledger from red to black unless his team is a winner.

"I'll trade anybody—providing what I get in return means a first or second place finish for the Phillies," Carpenter said. "I'm certainly not going to give away first stringers for second stringers."

"Yes, that includes Robin Roberts, Curt Simmons, Granny Hamner, Richie Ashburn and Del Ennis. But remember, I've got to get value for value."

The Phillies' owner is counting on a young, hard hitting rookie from Syracuse named Marvin Blaylock to take over first base. Blaylock hit .300 in the International League last season.
