GREECE AND TURKEY.

Interests of Greece Confided to the Powers.

HORRID BARBARITY OF TURKS.

The Greeks Already Leaving Crete.

ATHENS, May 12.—In reply to a note of the Powers offering mediation to Greece the Government of the latter has replied that Greece, on taking note of the declaration of the Powers, will proceed to recall the royal troops from Crete, and confides the interests of Greece to the hands of the Powers.

ARTA, May 12.—It is reported that the Turks have severed the legs and arms of all the Greeks found in a village of the plains of Louros, and left their mutilated bodies by the roadside to terrorize the population.

CANEA, May 12.—The Greek troops are already leaving Crete on board three Greek steamers.

CONSTANTINOPLE, May 12.—The Porte has given a positive denial to the statement that Sheik ul Islam has issued a circular to the Muslims in Constantinople foreshadowing a holy war.

CONSTANTINOPLE, May 12.—The expenses of the war are estimated at £5,000,000, which Greece will have to pay as an indemnity, in annual instalments, guaranteed by the Thessalian revenue.

NOTES FROM THE CAPITAL.

Mr. Davin and the Ministers' Good Faith.

A Useless Official Absent Electioneering Maintained on Full Pay.

OTTAWA, May 12.—The House of Commons, in supply yesterday afternoon, made fair progress with the contingency vote.

Before the Speaker left the chair Mr. Davin proposed an amendment stating that good faith on the part of the Ministers demanded that agricultural implements be placed on the free list. The amendment was lost on division.

In the evening Mr. Taylor stated that the Deputy Speaker, a salaried officer of the House, had been absent during the greater part of the last fortnight engaged in the Quebec election campaign. Other members of the House had taken the chair in his place, and as the House seemed to get on pretty well without him he moved that the \$2,000 paid him be struck out.

Mr. Foster, Sir Hibbert Tupper, Mr. Craig and other Opposition members supported the motion.

Mr. Pettit, the Patron member, moved that the salary be reduced one-half.

Mr. Taylor's motion was lost in committee by a vote of 32 to 50, and Mr. Pettit's by a vote of 36 to 52.

The Quebec Elections.

MONTREAL, May 12.—The province of Quebec has gone Liberal.

The returns give 54 Liberals and 19 Conservatives.

Mr. Flynn is himself defeated in Gaspé.

LATER.

QUEBEC, May 12.—Hon. Mr. Flynn is elected in Gaspé. This will make the parties stand: Liberals 53, Conservatives 20.

LATEST NEWS BY WIRE AND MAIL.

NEW YORK, May 10.—The fight to-night between Joe Choynski and Denver Ed. Smith, was awarded to Choynski in the fourth round by the referee on a foul.

MELBOURNE, May 10.—A severe seismic disturbance took place today in South Australia and Victoria. The shock was intermittent and continued for several minutes.

LONDON, May 11.—The Athens correspondent of the Times says: "The Greek army has been compelled to abandon Salagora and Fort Inaret, the Turks having occupied the heights commanding the latter."

LONDON, May 10.—A terrible explosion has taken place on the Isle of Man in the Snaefell lead mine. A large number of miners were entombed, and it now seems certain that at least 17 have been killed.

CAPE TOWN, May 10.—Besides the army reserves in Natal having been called out, a million rounds of Lee-Metford cartridges and an immense quantity of shells will leave London for South Africa and it is rumored there will be 35,000 British troops in South Africa in a few months.

TORONTO, May 10.—The Evening Telegram's special cable from London says: "His support of the sale of intoxicating liquors (Ireland) bill has directed to Hon. Edward Blake, M. P., South Longford, some general attention as well as unfavorable comment from his fellow Irish members, who assert that in a matter of much more important questions Blake has been indifferent or overlooked them completely."

"Enquiry today, at the Belgian and German embassies, elicits the information that the preferential clauses of the new Dominion tariff will be strongly opposed."

LONDON, May 10.—The Speaker's Constantinople correspondent says: The Sultan has done his work thoroughly. He was never so strong as today. Now his policy will be magnanimous. It has been said that the pride of success would make him insufferable to the Powers. I do not believe it. Their meekness and long suffering are inexhaustible, and he is too weary to trespass upon them when there is nothing to gain. He has already intimated his desire to end the war. Having vindicated his honor, and destroyed the prestige of Greece, he says he is distressed by the waste of life and property, and asks, why not restore the status quo ante bellum? He says he knows this will be the result of the war, however long it may last. So he is ready for peace at once. Only one contingency may bring the Sultan in conflict with Europe. He may find the military party too strong. The party is opposed to giving back Thessaly to Greece. It is believed here even by some of those in diplomatic circles that if the Sultan insists upon holding Thessaly, no European Power will go to war to turn him out by force, especially if there should be a revolution in Greece.

St. Patricks church, Sherbrook, Que., was badly damaged by fire a few nights ago.

A British officer and thirty coolies have been killed by an avalanche in the Sprin-garhi road, India.

Bagpipers are becoming a fashionable instrument for ladies in British drawing rooms, Lady El-peth Campbell, the Duke of Argyll's granddaughter, who is a skilled performer having introduced the fashion. The pipes for drawing room use are richly decorated and specially toned.

Mrs. Max Muller, who has spent considerable time among the Turks, says they do not seem to feel at home in Europe, but that they are "strong and steady and determined to fight to the bitter end before they surrender what for 400 years they have called their own."
