Colder Weather Is Approaching

After a reasonably fine Christmas day, forecasters are predicting a return to weather similar to what the island received Monday and Tuesday of this week — cold and windy with the possibility of snowflurries to day.

The fine weather began to disappear yesterday as the sky began to cloud and the temperatures dropped. Charlottetown recorded a low-high of two and 16 degrees while Summerside only managed to reach seven above.

The temperatures were expected to drop even further during the night and before day-break this morning were forecast in the neighborhood of two below.

Winds were also high yesterday. Higher in fact than those of Tuesday when many travellers were delayed on their way home for Christmas. Winds yesterday were gusting as high as 50 miles per hour whereas, on Tuesday 38 m.p.h. was the stiffest blow.
