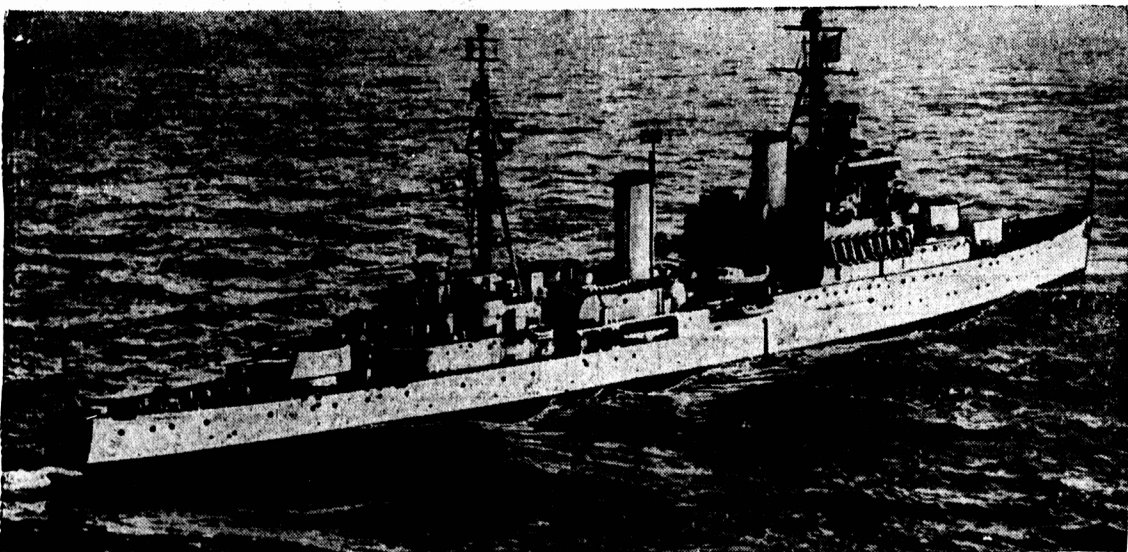

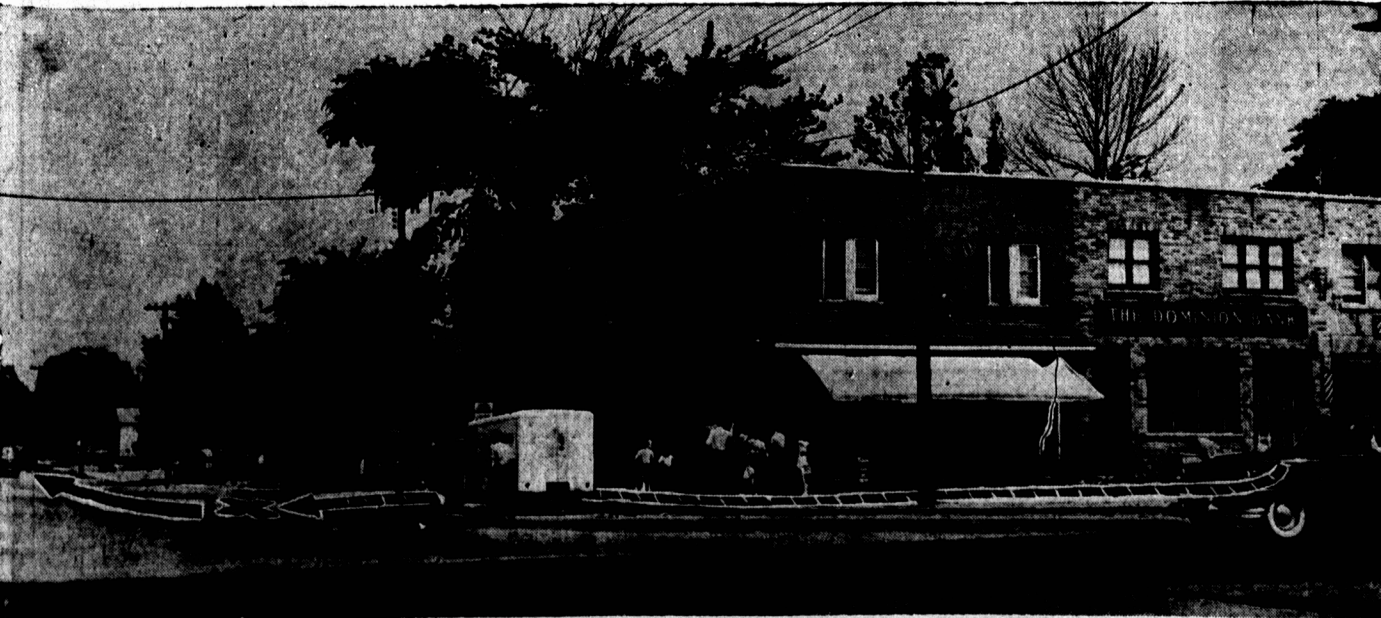
During heavy Anglo-American bombardment of East Korea, the British cruiser, Jamaica, shown, was struck by a Communist shell. Six were killed, the first British casualties. Ship was only slightly damaged. Action was directed at North Koreans driving down main road to U.S. supply base at Pusan. Bombardment caused two landslides.



Communist North Korean invaders broke a desperate Southern counter-attack to save the front-line capital of Southern Korea, Seoul, then threw heavy tank reinforcements into a new direct strike at the city's crumbling defences.



Aging president of Korea, Syngman Rhee, above, and his cabinet stood fast in Seoul under confused attack and counter-attack. But with the battle going against South Korea, the cabinet withdrew to a point more distant.



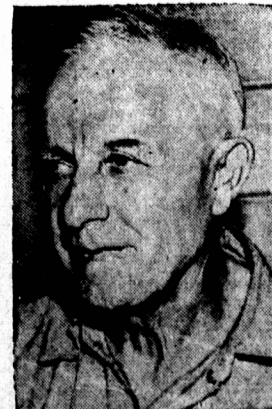

Peppered with pellets, John Fick, 71, is nursing wounds and George Parker, 70, his friend of long standing, is under arrest after an argument over the Langton bank robbery and murders flared into gunfire. The two men quarrelled in Parker's shack, near Langton, Ont. Their heated argument over the robbery and murder led to a lively wrestling match and finally Parker ordered Fick off his property, then shot him in the back.
