## Antilitter Drives In U.S.A. Gaining National Momentum

Trash pick-ups costs are tumbling down on a Wisconsin's highway system in the state's "Keep Wisconsin Clean and Beautiful" campaign.

These has been a 50 percent reduction of clean-up costs since the Green Bay Packers game as a result of that city's antilitter drive.

These achievements were recounted here as Gov. Warren P. Knowles arrived to accept an award from Keep America Beautiful, Inc., national public service organization devoted to litter prevention.

KAB conducts a year-round program of public education to stimulate pride in clean surroundings and a feeling of personal responsibility for proper disposal of litter. The effort is backed by a national advertising campaign sponsored by the Advertising Council. It is financed by business and industry, labor unions, and trade associations.

"This is a wonderful tribute to the efforts of so many citizens and organizations throughout our state," Governor Knowles declared. "It is one of the finest aspects of life in America in the 'sixties'."

Despite a marked rise in vehicles and miles of highway traveled, clean-up costs on Wisconsin's trunk highways dropped down to \$383,940 for 1965 from \$422,500 in 1964 and from a peak of \$474,000 in 1963. The Governor credited the improvement to antilitter and beautification campaigns, greater availability and use of litterbags, and a "realistic" \$25 fine for violators.

Other KAB awards went this year to:

Bridgeport, Conn., where a "flying squadron" of volunteers makes regular litter inspections (it recently convinced a reluctant owner of a refreshment stand to hire a special litter pickup man.)

A square in the heart of the central business district used to serve as a magnet for litter. Thanks to the Beautify Bridgeport Council, it now is a beautiful park with trees, flowers, grass and walks - all kept clean and litter-free by a proud public. Contributions are pouring in for a veterans' memorial fountain for the square. A drive is under way for more attractive gas stations.

DeRidder, La.: This town of 8,500 persons with a slogan "deLitter DeRidder" has, among other things, launched a new kind of garbage collection eliminating garbage cans standing on curbs. The containers - called "Gar-Box" are metal and hold a lined, 35-gallon, water-resistant bag. Full bags are replaced by the garbage collection crew with clean empties.

Collection is made at the rear of homes. DeRidder school children created an art exhibit from litter materials, emphasizing the turning of ugliness into beauty.

Home economics director Margaret Deeds Murphy, known as "Maggie" to her friends, is in charge of this beautiful kitchen and dining room.

Three special time-saving guest luncheon menus have been developed. Maggie generously agreed to share them with us. Today we give two of the menus: tomorrow we column the third.

MAGGIE'S LUNCHEON MENU I  
Veal Scallopini  
Green Noodles  
Asparagus Vinaigrette  
Rolls Soft Margarine  
Butter Pecan Ice Cream with Hot Spiced Applesauce  
Coffee Chocolates  
Note: Passing chocolates with the coffee is unusual, and welcome.

Measurements serve 6  
recipes level  
VEAL SCALLOPINI  
2 1/2 lb. tender veal  
1/4 c. flour  
1 tsp. salt  
1/2 tsp. pepper

3 to 5 tsp. safflower oil  
3 peeled sections garlic; fine-chopped  
4 small peeled onions chopped

2 c. tomato juice  
1 c. dry white wine  
2 c. beef bouillon  
1 tsp. powdered dried rosemary  
1/2 lb. noodles, preferably green, cooked  
3 tsp. chopped parsley  
Order well sliced very thin. Cut into 2" squares. Pound with a meat mallet or edge of a heavy saucer until the slices are about 1-3 thinner, forming the "scallopini". Dredge them lightly with flour, salt and pepper.

Slow-browns on both sides in oil. Remove veal from pan. To same pan, add garlic and onions and saute until soft; add tomato juice, wine and bouillon; simmer together for 10 min. Add rosemary and browned meat to sauce; simmer - cook covered for 1 hr.

Transfer to hot platter; surround with noodles, either white or green, cooked according to direction on pkg.; dust all over with parsley. All alcohol in the wine evaporates while cooking.

CHICKEN WITH ARTICHOKE HEARTS  
3 tsp. flour  
1/2 tsp. salt  
1/4 tsp. pepper  
6 boned breasts of chicken  
3 tsp. safflower oil  
1/2 c. chicken broth  
1 1/2 pkg. (9 oz.) frozen artichoke hearts (Use remaining 1/2 pkg. to cook and use in a salad)  
1/2 tsp. crumbled tarragon leaves  
1/4 c. chicken broth, additional  
Combine flour, salt and pepper on large square of waxed paper. Roll chicken pieces in flour mixture. Heat oil in large heavy aluminum skillet; add chicken and brown on all sides. Add first 1/2 c. of chicken broth; cover and simmer 15 min. Add frozen artichoke hearts, tarragon and additional chicken broth. Cover, and simmer 30 min. or until both chicken and artichokes are fork-tender. Remove cover the last 10 min. to reduce the broth to pan - gravy consistency.

## AUDITOR 1 \$7,450 - \$8,950

The Auditor General is directly responsible to Parliament. The function of his office is to examine the accounts of government departments, Crown corporations and other public instrumentalities. He reports on his examinations annually to the House of Commons.

The Auditor General's Office has its headquarters in Ottawa, with regional offices in Halifax, Montreal, Toronto, Winnipeg, Edmonton and Vancouver. Its staff is a highly qualified professional group including many members of recognized professional accounting organizations. The Office carries out its work in much the same manner as large independent public accounting firms. Its over-all objective is to determine that the various instrumentalities have discharged their management and financial responsibilities effectively. The audit procedures followed include the evaluation of the adequacy of internal controls, including management reports and internal auditing, review of operations in order to determine that funds and other resources have been used effectively, and the examination of financial transactions to the extent considered necessary to certify financial statements.
