Dodgers Club Flyers To Take Game Lead In Finals

Charlie Ryan's battling Dodgers rained home 5 runs in the top half of the first inning and made it stand up over the short five frame distance to take a 7-2 victory over the Flyers and a one game lead in the best three of five finals of the City Baseball League at Memorial Field last evening.

It doesn't happen too often but Paul Jay pitched the full five innings for the Dodgers and yet didn't get credit for the win. Starter Ryan was the winning hurler although he pitched to only one batter, Bobby Lund, in the last of the first. Ryan walked Lund and retired in favor of Jay who was in the box for the 15 outs.

Donnie MacLean went the route for the Flyers giving up only five hits, some less than his mates garnered off Jay - but was as wild as a March wind giving 5 free passes to first, hitting 3 batters and unworking 3 wild pitches.

The Dodgers first inning runs were enough to win but they added two more in the fifth as coach Ryan squeezed Whitlock home from third with a nice bunt and MacKinnon raced in on an error. Brian Lewis drove in both of the Flyers runs with the only extra base blow of the game - a double in the third.

Coker Pineau came up with one of the finest infield plays of the year when he made a backhand stab of MacKinnon's hot grass-cutter in the third and tossed him out at first.

Forbie Kennedy rapped out a pair of singles to lead the Dodgers at the plate and McCallum, Whitlock and Gillis got the others.

Bobby Lund had a pair of hits for the Flyers and Jack Burke, Elmer MacNeil and pitcher MacLean had singles.

Chicago Retains League Lead With 4-2 Win Over Boston; Tribe Drops Orioles

Jim Rivera cracked a pair of two-run homers that retained Chicago's first place lead in the steaming American League race Wednesday, carrying the White Sox to a 4-2 triumph over Boston Red Sox, now faced with a five-game deficit in fourth place.

Cleveland had second place all to itself, at least temporarily, by banging Baltimore 5-1 while Herb Score fanned 13, running his strikeout total to 209. That left the Indians a half game behind the White Sox and a half game up on New York Yankees, who could keep a share of the runner up spot by winning a night game at Kansas City.

In the only other AL game, Earl Torgeson hit a pinch home run with two on in the seventh inning, that lifted Detroit to a 7-4 decision over Washington.

KEEGAN PRODUCES

The White Sox won on a gamble with right-hander Bob Keegan, who spaced eight hits for his first victory and initial complete game since Sept. 12, 1954, when he also beat the Sox. Keegan (14) gave up Norm Zauchin's 25th home run in the sixth and was touched for a double by Sam White that scored the other run in the ninth.

Keegan had his working margin early. Rivera tagged his first homer off loser Tom Brewer, in the first inning, then reached the Red Sox right-hander for his clincher in the third. Jungle Jim has hit four homers this season off Brewer, who now is 9-10.

Chamberlain Winner As Cattle Breeder

SHERBROOKE (CP)—Murphy Chamberlain, former National Cattle League forward turned cattle-breeder, Tuesday exhibited the senior and grand champion female Holstein at the annual Sherbrooke fair.

Chamberlain, who retired from Montreal Canadiens shortly after the Second World War to devote his time to his farm at Bedford, Que., won both ribbons in cattle judging with one entry.

The senior and grand champion ribbons for bulls went to the Wales Home farm of Richmond, Que. George Glader of Sutton, Que., exhibited the junior and reserve grand champion bull while P. Pappin of Warwick, Que., had the reserve grand champion female.

In the Ayrshire class, David Johnston of Stanstead, Que., was awarded the senior champion ribbon in the bull division. Roger Beaudry of Granby won the junior and grand champion awards and the Mount Brothers of Bromo, Que., the reserve grand champion title.

Exhibition officials said attendance was up considerably over last year.

Earlier, Elmwood Lodge of Shawville, Que., and Lucien Dompierre of Bromo were chosen to represent Quebec province in a national dairy cattle judging contest to the Royal Winter Fair in Toronto in November.

Germain Rioux and Germain Pettigrew of Trois Pistoles, Que., were named to represent the province in the swine-judging contest.

He threw Boyer out of the ring into the shavings and though Roger crawled along gallantly towards the apron of the ring, he couldn't make it in the prescribed time limit.

The third bout was a tag match affair. There was plenty of action in this four-man ensemble, with the opponents outside the ring taking every opportunity to commit assault and battery on those applying toe holds and half Nelsons in the squared circle. Boyer and Gorgeous George were against Dupree and LeBlanc in this encounter.

After each side had secured fall, the match came to a grand finale when Tiny LeBlanc threw Boyer out of the ring, and following him grabbed a chair from a spectator and swinging it wildly in the air as Boyer lay grovelling in the shavings, brought it down savagely within a couple of yards of the unfortunate Boyer's cranium. For this act of near mayhem the LeBlanc-Dupree combination, unpopular with the frenzied crowd all evening, were disqualified.

DUQUOIN, Ill. (AP)—Pronto Don, the top money-winning harness race horse of all time, was retired Wednesday.

The 10-year-old sorrel gelding was turned to pasture by his owners, Hayes Fair Acres of Duquoin with an earned record of \$332,000.

Among his leading triumphs were the \$50,000 Golden West trot which he won three times, the \$50,000 Roosevelt trot which he won twice, the Hoosier Futurity and most of the leading trotting events. He missed only the Hambletonian for which he was ineligible.

His record time was 1:59.35.

Nashua Winner Over Swaps

CHICAGO (AP)—With heart, speed, stamina and the feel of jockey Eddie Arcaro's whip from the start, the powerful Nashua ran Swaps into the ground Wednesday, scoring a 6 1/2-length victory in their \$100,000 winner-take-all match race at Washington Park.

The big mahogany bay owned by William Woodward Jr. burst from the gate first and was never headed.

The victory wiped out Nashua's only defeat in nine previous starts as a three-year-old when Swaps, Rex Ellsworth's big chestnut charger from California, swept to a 1 1/2-length triumph in the Kentucky Derby.

Swaps was the 1-to-5 choice of the 35,262 fans in the pari-mutuel betting while Nashua went off a \$4.40 in the win-only betting.

The fact that highway speed laws aren't really set by any scientific study of safety, but just seem to be numbers pulled from a hat becomes especially apparent when you drive through the U. S. You may cross two or three states in a day and find the speed limit jumping up and down between 50, 55 and 60.

The American Automobile Association recently proposed a new method for setting highway speed limits. The idea is to let motorists themselves decide what a safe speed is.

It's done, like so many things these days, with radar. The AAA has found that a safe speed is usually the speed travelled by 85 percent of drivers on any particular road. So the AAA has asked that state-wide or province-wide speed laws, many of them unrealistically slow, be abolished in favor of the speed that radar devices show is the usual speed of 85 percent of motorists.

Figures I noticed recently showed that, contrary to what I always believed, most highway accidents don't happen at high speeds. A study in Nebraska established that 73 percent of all accidents occurred at less than 30 miles an hour. When speed limits were raised in Nebraska accidents were reduced and the average speed of the cars on the highway didn't change at all which only went to prove drivers were ignoring old speed limits anyway and driving at what they thought was a safe speed.
