

# Four-Goal Third Period Gives S.D.U. 5-2 Victory

St. Dunstan's University overcame a slim 2-1 lead with a four-goal outburst in the third period to drop the Montague Primroses 5-2 at the Sports Arena last night and take a one-game lead in their best-of-five semi-final series in the Island Senior League.

Once again it was speedy Paul (Buck) Davey who led the Saints to victory. Davey fired the Saints opener in the first period and added the insurance marker at 16:11 of the third. Other Saints to hit pay dirt were defenseman Lewis MacDonald, Rodney MacInnis and Jack Kane who scored on an open Montague net in the late minutes of the third.

Big Mike Connolly scored Montague's first goal in the opening period and coach Cecil (Bobby) Dowling got the second marker in the last five minutes of the middle session.

The biggest crowd of the year pushing 1,300 sat in on the contest that opened slow but picked up speed as the game progressed until in the third when both squads were flying in high gear.

The first period ended 1-1. Montague got the only goal of the second but two goals within a space of 35 seconds in the third made the difference, although the Saints added another brace to put it on ice.

Referees Joe Revell and Brian MacCallum passed around 13 two-minute sentences, with the Saints collecting 8 of them. Two of the S. D. U. penalties cost goals. Connolly scored with Veilleux off in the first and with Mullins in the box in the third Jack Kane scored as the penalty backfired on Montague.

D. U. and coasted in about 15 feet from the blueline before whizzing a low hard shot that caught the corner.

Saints came close to scoring on a couple of occasions in the second period. Ed MacDonald missed the open corner on Davey's pass and once again when Ward grabbed a loose puck that was just about to roll over the goal line. But it was left to Montague to do the trick as Dick Carroll intercepted an S. D. U. pass at center and sent Bobby Dowling into the clear. The Montague playing-coach sailed right in on Gillis' doorstep before hitting the twines on a low shot.

## Hall Scores 11th Shutout Blanking Boston Bruins 2-0

BOSTON, (AP)—Detroit Red Wings nailed down their National Hockey League playoff berth and night by defeating Boston Bruins 2-0.

A 30-foot drive by defenseman Red Kelly early in the third period ended more than three-quarters of an hour of scoreless hockey in which the Bruins had taken a wide territorial edge. Marty Pavelich's unassisted tally 10 minutes later wrapped up the verdict.

The victory gave Detroit second place just 24 hours after they lost it to New York Rangers, who downed the Bruins 4-2 Wednesday night and boosted the Red Wings into the playoffs for the 14th straight year, the longest current streak of Stanley Cup appearances by any NHL club and one short of Toronto Maple Leafs' record of 15 straight.

Rookie Glenn Hall of the Detroit nets was sensational in chalking up his 11th shutout.

He stopped 37 drives as the Bruins outshot Detroit by a wide margin and handled a number of difficult shots without a miscue. Only a single penalty, a first-period tripping sentence to Boston's Vic Stasiuk—was called in the fast-moving game.

## Hawks - Ramblers To Play Eighth Game In Chatham

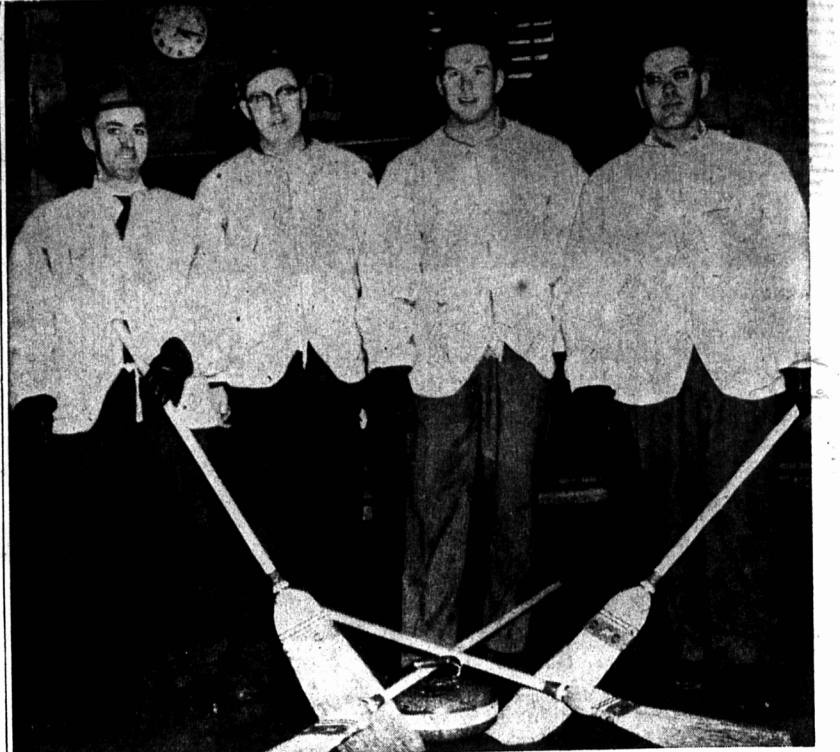
