HYPNOTISM RECOGNIZED.—The Supreme Court of Texas recently rendered a decision in which hypnotism is recognized both as a defence and a ground for conviction of crime. On March 24th last Thomas McDonald shot and killed Thomas Patten. He was arrested, charged with the murder, and set up as a defence that he was under the hypnotic influence of Anderson Gray, and neither legally nor morally responsible for the deed. He was acquitted and then Gray was put under arrest and tried for murder in the first degree, notwithstanding the fact that he was not present when the crime was committed, the evidence of the state only going to show he caused McDonald to do the deed through hypnotic influence. An appeal was taken by the Supreme Court, and in the opinion of the latter the ruling of the lower court was sustained. ST. DUNSTON'S COLLEGE NOTES.—The usual suspension of classes during Holy Week commences at St. Dunstan's College to-day, and regular work will not be again resumed till Monday next. Some of the students have gone to spend their Easter at home. Those who remain attended in a body the services at the Cathedral last evening, and the College choir assisted that of the Cathedral in the vocal part of the ceremony. The part rendered by the boys manifested a high degree of culture, and indicated the careful training and supervision of Rev Father McDougall. They were also present at this morning's services. This routine will be continued until the end of the week. The Rev Rector, Dr. Morrison, accompanied Bishop McDonald to Georgetown yesterday afternoon to assist at the blessing of the oils this morning, previous to His Lordship's departure for Home. Dr. Morrison is expected to return this evening.

LATEST SUMMERSIDE NEWS.

Special Correspondence of The Examiner. People of this town regret to hear of the death of Mrs. Frank Bennett, who died in Charlottetown on the 8th inst. Mrs. Bennett had been a resident of this town for about thirty years, and was respected and esteemed by all who knew her. Rev. George Murray, of Montague, was in town yesterday. Mr. Levi Silliphant purchased a porker yesterday, which weighed nearly seven hundred pounds. The Superintendent of Car passed through here en route West, yesterday. Mr. Robert Sobey is at work replacing the glass in the window of Walsh's Book-store, which was broken by the heat of the late fire. The plate glass in the Bank will not be put in before the opening of navigation, when it will be brought from Montreal in the steamship M ramich. The annual meeting of the Methodist Sunday School Board was held last night in Epworth Hall, Rev. R. W. Weddell in the chair. Reports of various officers were read, and officers and teachers appointed for the ensuing year. Mr. George Ellis, proprietor of the Albion Terrace House, Alberton, was here yesterday. Arrangements are being made by the Imperial Dramatic Company to play in Kensington in about two weeks time. Mr. George Corroy, of Tignish, was at the R. S. yesterday. FIGHTING INDIAN BILMENS. The London Times' correspondent in Calcutta says: "The Chittur expedition against the Malabar pishas on March 3rd. There was sharp fighting for five hours. The enemy, who were 12,000 strong, lost heavily, and ever since have been in full retreat. The British loss was slight. The first battle was passed over into Swat. A despatch received at Calcutta from the Malakani Pass, via Simla, on the 4th, at 4.30 a. m., says the operations of the British troops against the Khan, of Umdoo, the invader of Chittur, in the pass itself were commenced by the guides, who were sent to clear the hills on the left. The Maxim rapid firing guns were placed to the front whenever they got within range of the enemy, who were composed of Swat, Malakani and Umdoo Khan's supporters. The British troops advanced with spirit in spite of the fact that the roadway over the pass was cut away in many places and that Sangars, or stone breastworks, were constructed, at various points, and were carried at the point of the bayonet. Fifty of the British forces were wounded, including three officers severely and four slightly injured. Only three soldiers of the British force were killed. The enemy lost 500 killed and wounded. The above mentioned expedition vindicates the prowess of British arms where vindication was needed. About March 23rd news came that the British troops were on their way to relieve a British outpost at Reshan, were surrounded by a thousand Chitturs. The British force fought desperately, and less than twenty British escaped from the fray. The British force was killed. Within two weeks after the news arrived a British-Indo army of 14,500 men with mountain batteries carried on elephants was en route to conquer the territory which hitherto had only been under nominal suzerainty. The above battle would appear to be the first fruits of the campaign. The prompt expedition of a complete army within so few days gives a fair conception of what a great military power is the British India Government.
