Five Cyclists Injured On Road At Abram's Village

SUMMERSIDE — Five young cyclists, boys ages 10 to 15, were injured by a car which crashed into their bicycles on the highway at Abrams Village yesterday afternoon. Two of the five are in hospital at Summerside, while the other three were less seriously hurt. Cedric Arsenault, 12-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Adrien Arsenault of Urbanville, was reported to be in serious condition with chest injuries which included a lacerated (collapsed) lung. Raymond Arsenault, 12-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Edmund Arsenault of Urbanville, is also in hospital with a head injury which is expected to be x-rayed today. The other three boys who escaped with various minor injuries and were able to return to their homes, are Donat Richard, 15, son of Mr. Richard, and late Mrs. Richard of Urbanville; Arthur Arsenault, 12, son of Mr. and Mrs. Sylvère Arsenault, Urbanville; and Roy Arsenault, 10, son of Mr. and Mrs. George Arsenault, Abrams Village. All of the five bicycles which the boys were riding were said to have been damaged. The accident reportedly occurred about 2:30 p. m. on a straight stretch of road about one half mile east of Abrams Village, while the five cyclists were proceeding westward to the shore. Driver of the car involved in the accident was said to be Fred Casey, an Egmont Bay youth, driving a 1939 Ford car. Details of the accident were not available, but the Casey car proceeding in the same direction as the cyclists, was reported to be passing a car driven by Roy Curran of Egmont Bay about the time the collision occurred with the bicycles. After striking the cyclists the car is believed to have left the highway and overturned, but the three occupants in the motor vehicle apparently escaped injury.
