FREEDOM IS KEYNOTE.

REV. PRINCIPAL GRANT INVESTIGATES CAUSES OF THE EMPIRE'S GREATNESS.

Rev. Principal Grant, of Queen's University, occupied the pulpit of St. Andrew's Church, Montreal, last Sunday. In his morning's sermon, he referred to the greatness of the British Empire, and said that the word freedom to the British people meant the supremacy of reason and conscience, for he alone was free whom the truth made free. The trend of Principal Grant's sermon was explained by his opening questions. "What is the will of God, concerning our country, our nation, and what is the mission which God wishes us to perform, or what are we here for?" He continued: "We can see how earnestly the prophets of Israel reflected on these subjects, and their writings express their views on what the will of God concerning Israel was. They believed that he had a purpose of love for the whole world, to be accomplished through Israel. Even in failure they saw the guiding hand of God. They thoroughly believed that a good time would come when the knowledge of the Lord would cover the earth as the waters cover the sea, when Israel should be chosen to accomplish that great purpose of love. From Abraham onward he selected fit agents in church and state to accomplish his purposes, and their whole history was luminous with what they accomplished. It is the mirror and the key to the scenes of universal history. Their history teaches that they believed that all would be well if they did the work of God.

"To-day is there any nation which occupies the place of Israel? No. The kingdom of Israel burst through its bonds in Jesus Christ, and no one nation now has the right to say it occupies Israel's position. But that nation is greatest which best follows our God's commands.

"That nation is great whose men of pure hearts and lives are the leaders of the people in thought and action, if the nation as a whole is true to its deepest spiritual welfare. Then mistakes are lost sight of in its greatest accomplishments.

"In our own nation we find much in its symbols to give us hope and inspiration. Our Queen, who combines much loyalty and personal affection, is a symbol of the nation's loyalty. Then our flag which represents the life of the whole nation for centuries is a symbol of the highest idea which can descend to earth.

"The Bible teaches us that righteousness exalteth a nation, and in its symbols we find the deepest and truest mission of our nation.

"For over a thousand years freedom has been the day star of the nation. There has been a continual struggle and sacrifice, but though failures and mistakes have been made the trend of the national life is discernible. There has been a struggle for the political, commercial, social, moral, intellectual and spiritual freedom alike in all cases.

"There were struggles from the time of the heptarchy on to the time of King Alfred, when peace was established, which none dared disturb for a long time. There was a struggle by the Barons against King John, ending in the signing of the Great Charter at Runnymede, which charter is still a birthright of the nation. There were struggles by Wallace and Bruce, ending in independence of Scotland. From the struggles of Knox on to the days of the Covenanters, when Scotland became more than any other a nation of God; through the times of Wycliffe, Latimer, the Reformation, the religious struggles of Elizabeth and the destruction of the Spanish Armada; from the struggles of the Long Parliament, of Stafford and Laud, down to the Protectorate when Cromwell was a name which gave courage to every Protestant; from the struggles of the foolish Jacobites in to the adoption of the

Bill of Rights, of Wilberforce against slavery, so that there is none now under the British flag; from the struggles of a weak king until the thirteen New England colonies were declared independent, past the West India slavery struggles, the political struggles of O'Connell down to the Catholic emancipation of Ireland, from the struggles of the people in England on to the abolition of the corn laws, and from the days of responsible government in the British colonies, through the time of Confederation in Canada down to the present, the one great keynote of our kingdom has been freedom. It has combined ecclesiastical, social, political, moral and intellectual freedom. This was the great cause for which our great men suffered and died, fearing neither death nor persecution so long as the cause was advanced and converts made.

"For that, Alfred endured hardships, martyrs were burnt at the stake, Milton languished in poverty and Bunyan in prison, Sidney and Russell laid down their lives, and seven bishops went to prison. To gain freedom, the Pilgrim Fathers left their homes for New England, Livingstone died alone in South Africa, and Gordon with equal piety in Khartoum. For it, our fathers have always stood, on many a dark day when strong men cowered and many a cheek was blanched.

"God is leading each of us and has led our nation forward for some work. Will we obey? Obedience will cost us something, but disobedience will cost us our life and soul. Am I accomplishing God's will concerning me? Have I no work, no mission, am I too insignificant? How can we dare say these when He says that not a sparrow falleth to the ground without His knowledge. But God also chooses the meek and lowly for his work. Think of the grandeur of being a child of God!

"There is a region of our being where God is willing to take up his abode, to inspire and comfort us till death. Will we receive him?"
