S'side Veteran Returns From Korean War

The first Summerside veteran of the Korean war, Pte. Claude Arsenault, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ben N. Arsenault, Myrtle Street, to return home arrived over the week end after six months active service near the 38th parallel in Korea. Pte. Arsenault, who is attached to the second division of the Princess Pats. Canadian Light Infantry, enlisted in August 1950 and went to Calgary, Alta., for basic training. After four months he was sent to Fort Lewis, Washington, and remained there until February last from where he and about 20 others flew to Tokyo, Japan. He saw active service from that time until the first week in July when he was returned to Canada on sick leave. During his entire service he was fortunate enough to escape injury although he had engaged in considerable fighting. He said that now there is no actual North Korean army, it has been absorbed by the Chinese Communists and all of the engagements in which he took part were against the Chinese troops. Pte. Arsenault has been relieved of further overseas duties but will remain in the army and intends to take up the study of electricity. He will report back to Halifax tomorrow.-S.
