Running upwards from the lip and to the left side of his nose was a deep scar being held together with half a dozen stitches. It looked like the kind of a wound that would make a man think he was carrying an egg around on his face and which would make a hockey fan think there's no tougher job than that of a goalie.

Hal claimed that he was feeling good although he felt that he could not have been telling the whole truth. Earlier he told coach Leo Lamoureux the same thing and also that he was quite willing to play. Many a lesser man would have begged off from playing but not Hal. For the first ten minutes he appeared a bit shaky but after that he settled away to play a wonderful game. He kept out three men who broke in on him all alone and he certainly must have gained the admiration of his fellow team-mates and opponents alike for there's one thing an athlete likes to be able to say about another athlete and that is "He's got lots of it down here," while pointing to his stomach.

Last night in Saint John Hal got away to another shaky start and the reason should not be hard to figure out. After that he was practically unbeatable according to reports coming out of Saint John. In the second period he had approximately 18 shots and handled them all except one. In our books that is good goal tending and one that is deserving of praise especially when it is accomplished by a guy who possibly should be sitting on the bench as the result of an injury. During this same period Phil Hughes had one shot.

In Tuesday night's game there was a right winger by the name of Johnny Morrow who turned in one of his finest games. Johnny was playing better than at any time since he left Moncton last year and for his efforts he was awarded with three points. As a back-checker Morrow has no peer and it is very seldom that his check ever scores a goal. He also possesses one of the hardest shots on the team. Johnny played on the Fresno team with Ubracio, Mesich, McCracken and several other members of the present Saint John Beavers.

On Saturday night basketball fans will be treated to a blue ribbon hoop feature at Saint Dunstan's College gymnasium when meet in an exhibition game. SAINT JOHN, N. B., Nov. 21. (CP)—Saint John Beavers, further stretching their lead in the Maritime Major Hockey League, trimmed Charlottetown Islanders 4-2 tonight and scored their 100th goal in 22 games.

Beavers now enjoy a 18-point advantage over Islanders, Glace Bay Miners and Moncton Hawks, all tied for second place in the six-team loop as a result of other games tonight.

The league leaders shot three in the first period and another in the second before Islanders counted twice in the final stanza. Johnny Ubracio set up a brace for Tom Smelle and Howie Lee and Bill McCracken soloed. Buck Whitlock started the Charlottetown scoring and then assisted Bruno Favero.

REGINA, Nov. 21. (CP)—Regina's Union Station looked like the scene of a gentlemen's convention this afternoon as close to 500 white-stetsoned Saskatchewan football fans boarded two special trains that will carry them to Toronto for Saturday's Grey Cup grid classic.

Football fever here was never higher. There was no holding the whooping crowd of Toronto-bound fans and the hundreds more than packed the station to see them off.

It was the noisiest, gayest and most colorful crowd that Regina has seen in many a year—but only an example of a bigger and better show that fans hope to put on if their Roughriders return with the Grey Cup.

The fans were decked out in the distinctive white stetsons, plaid shirts and blue jeans that will spell the west to the men of Toronto.

Ottawa Rough Riders Waltz Into Cup Finals

OTTAWA, Nov. 21. (CP)—The supremely-confident Ottawa Rough Riders today waltzed into the Grey Cup final with a 43-17 victory over the all-Canadian and always-trying Sarnia Imperials.

That's the story of the sudden-death eastern final played before a slim 3,000-crowd at Lansdowne Park.

For the short-handed Riders it was a tuneup for Saturday's cup classic against Saskatchewan Roughriders. Their football know-how and all-round superiority was evident from the opening whistle.

For that reason the cheers went to the under-dog Imps, only senior club in the country, apart from the colleges, that can boast a 100-per-cent home-brew lineup.

It was a far cry from the early and middle '30s when the Imps were a powerful force in the Canadian football picture. The last time these two clubs met, the Imperials came off with a 26-20 triumph in the Eastern Canadian final Sarnia won the Canadian championship when Regina defaulted.

Today's game was rough in spots, particularly early in the second half when the players used elbows, knees and fists along the line.

The game was played under almost-perfect football conditions with temperatures around the 25-above mark under a bright sun.
