SUMMERSIDE—Word has been received of the death of James A. McKay on Jan. 24, in Sacramento, Calif. Mr. McKay had just celebrated his 87th birthday.

He was the son of John A. and Charity Campbell McKay of Graham's Road, New London. He attended Graham's Road School as a boy, leaving for the west in early manhood.

He settled in southwestern Colorado, living in Teiride and Silverton and was a well known and beloved personality in the mining field. He retired to Sacramento, Calif.

He is survived by his widow, also a step-daughter, Mrs. Harriet Histed of San Francisco, and a stepson, Dr. William Burke of Sacramento, Calif. He leaves two sisters, Mrs. Mary Jane McKay of Charlottetown and Miss Pearl McKay of Belmont, Mass.; one brother, Bert McKay of New London, also several nieces and nephews.

The meeting was presided over by the vice-president, Lucy Ann Jelley. Devotional period was conducted by Eileen Hayter and Eva Wood.

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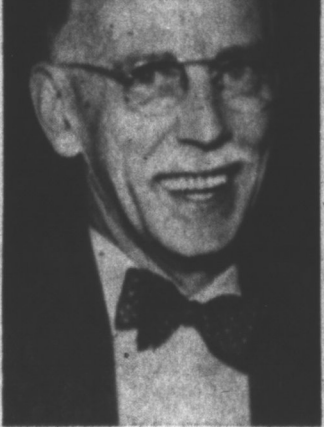
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Inventor Is Visited

Montague School Opening Ceremony Is Slated Today

MONTAGUE BUREAU OF THE GUARDIAN Official opening ceremonies for the new Montague elementary school will take place this afternoon with Hon. L. George Dewar, M.D., as the principal speaker. Guests and the public will meet at the Memorial School adjacent to the new elementary school at 2:30 p.m. and will proceed to the new school where Dr. Dewar will unveil the cornerstone and H. J. Hynes, inspector of schools, will cut the ribbon.

Mr. Hynes has served in an advisory capacity to the district for a number of years. He will be assisted at the ribbon cutting by Mrs. Elsie Waterworth, principal of the school.

Following the opening ceremonies, which will be held in the assembly hall, tea will be served by members of the Women's Institute and the Home and School Association.

Bible Society Is Talk Topic At Zion YPS

The work of the British and Foreign Bible Society and the challenge facing the society in Asia, especially China was the subject taken by Andrew Humphrey, manager of the Charlottetown Bible House, as guest speaker for the weekly meeting of Zion YPS held last night.

The film "Blessed Be He Who Leads", was also shown in conjunction with the Bible Society talk.

During the business meeting the YPS was informed of the "National Bulletin", a nationwide young peoples' magazine. Phyllis MacMillan reported on the plans for a candy table at the Zion Church Valentine tea. Bill MacMicken asked all young people to meet at the church Thursday evening to go to the experimental farm rink for a hockey game against St. James' Young Peoples Union.

Shirley Bell and Malcolm MacPherson led in worship, taking as their topic "The craft of Kindness."

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Many residents who have already inspected the school, have been very impressed with the interior design and decorations and have commented on the colored panels which decorate the exterior brick work. In recent years, shortage of classroom space has been a perpetual problem of the Montague School Board and in 1952 plans were formulated for a new six-room high school. Less than two years later it was found necessary to add a six-room wing to this building which provided 12 extra classrooms to the original nine room elementary school. Due to a rapidly increasing enrollment, even these facilities became crowded and following a disastrous fire in December 1959 in which the high school was wiped out, board members under chairman John Ballum undertook the task of replacing the lost building with a new 24-room high school of permanent construction with an adequate auditorium.

This school has now developed into the largest regional high school unit in the province and has expanded to such an extent that a ten-classroom addition is now under study. Work on this addition is expected to start in the early spring.

With the advent of the regional high school several elementary classrooms were still compelled to carry on outside the school and at a special school meeting in January

1961, chairman of the school board, Gilbert Clements, and board members put forth a proposal for a 20-room junior school.

Always cautious, the ratepayers voted this down and a 14-room school instead was approved with the result that the new school will be filled in capacity upon opening.

The elementary school was constructed by MacDonnell Construction Co., Ltd., of New Glasgow, N.S. and Keith Pichard was the architect. It is of steel, brick and concrete construction with the first floor three feet below ground level. It is a fireproof building with concrete block-walled corridors which are sanded and painted in pastel shades.

It contains 14 classrooms, an assembly room, principal's office and teachers' room. Thirteen teachers will make up the staff. The school was constructed at a cost of approximately \$170,000.

Gala Sportsmen's Dinner Attracts 200 At Morell

The Village of Morell was host last night to more than 200 persons, representing a cross-section of town and villages from Summerside to Souris, who attended the \$10-a-plate function to lend support to its \$45,000 community rink project.

Residents of Morell, who turned out in force for their first annual Sportsmen's Dinner, heard an array of speakers praise their initiative and spirit of co-operation for moving the undertaking to its present stage. The rink is scheduled for

completion in early February. Mike Hennessey, sports columnist of The Evening Patriot was guest speaker. He pointed out two diametrically opposed views upheld on physical fitness in Canada today; one opinion pointing to a low level of fitness, the other claiming sports programs for the youth of the country are over-organized.

Mr. Hennessey advocated a "middle of the road" course, designed to attain the "sound mind in a sound body" ideal, without sacrificing one for the sake of the other.

He paid tribute to Morell for its programs for youth, particularly in baseball and hockey, which have produced notable results in recent years.

Hon. Leo F. Rossiter, minister of industry and natural resources, and a resident of Morell, was master of ceremonies.

New School Is Planned For Occupancy In Oct.

Tenders will be called March 1 for the new Charlottetown elementary school to be built near the entrance to Crestwood Drive in the Brighton area. It is expected to be available for occupancy in October. Dr. K.A. Parker, superintendent of city schools, said yesterday.

There is no indication what it may be named, although the architect is using the term "Brighton" on his plans, to distinguish it from other projects, Dr. Parker declared.

There were some suggestions this morning that the name "Brighton" might be used to name the new school, although the decision will finally rest with the school board.

Dr. Parker suggested that citizens might participate in an effort later to suggest acceptable names for this school, and the other new school which is being built on Upper Queen Street.

The old names "West Kent" and "Queen Square" but in new locations, the old names will obviously not apply to the new buildings which will replace them.
