Miss Marjorie Stewart Wins Distinction for Herself and for the Island.

The eighth annual closing exercises of Edgell school for girls, Windsor, took place on Tuesday afternoon. LETTER FROM REV. J. SIMPSON.

Sir.—The suggestion of your correspondent that there should be an investigation by a competent commission concerning the cheating in the Public Schools and Prince of Wales College is a good one. But it will be difficult to get evidence, unless the commission be empowered to subpoena witnesses. Schoolboy honor forbids the betrayal of a companion for cheating, even if that companion has robbed another of a prize.

Among other things the following matters which are the subjects of common talk might be enquired into.

Is it true:—

1. That at Prince of Wales College students of the same year have been allowed to sit two at a desk at examinations?

2. That those in charge of the examinations leave the room on one pretext or another, and thus allow unlimited conversation during their absence?

3. That the examination questions are sometimes handed to parties outside, who write the answers and pass them in again, these answers being used by numbers of the students?

4. That students bring text books and notes into the examinations?

5. That at the entrance examination held at West Kent Street School last year candidates were allowed to leave their room during examination and that certain teachers were outside who gave them the information they required for their papers?

6. That at the same examination most bare-faced cheating was carried on?

7. That in some of the class rooms it is a common practice for children to keep their books on their knees during recitations?

If these things are not true let us know it at once; if they are true let us put a stop to such a disgraceful condition of affairs. The honor of the whole province is involved at present; no matter how hard a student works, or how honest he is, he always lies under a certain suspicion on account of the prevalent dishonesty.

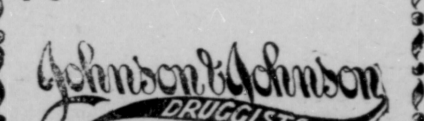
