DIES AT VICTORIA CROSS - The death occurred at his home at Victoria Cross on Sunday evening of John M. MacLeod in his 50th year, following a lengthy illness. The deceased was born at Victoria Cross, the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. John MacLeod, and pursued farming throughout his life.

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It was also resolved that the Department of National Defence and the Federal Department of Labor be requested to see that preference was given to veterans in the matter of labor on National Defence projects. Because of the present lack of appeal facilities the local Legionnaires are asking the Federal Government to permit the right to appeal pension decisions of the Appeal Board of the Canadian Pension Commission to the Exchequer Court of Canada, on grounds other than medical, without cost to the appellant.

(Continued from Page 1) It also asked that that City of Charlottetown and the Town of Summerside offer at least 65 cents per hour as a wage rate for unskilled labor to be laid down by the Provincial Government.

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Compulsory Training

The convention also went on record as urging the Government to institute a form of compulsory military training "to ensure proper preparedness in the event of an outbreak of hostilities." Several formal resolutions passed were concerned with the death of His Majesty King George Sixth, loyalty to Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth Second, and expressions of appreciation to the Ladies' Auxiliaries, the Dominion president, Dr. C. B. Lumsden, M.M.

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PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS

Following is the text of the address by the retiring President, Major Peake:

"This has been a year of joy and sadness for Canada and particularly for those of us who have served in her defence. Last Convention was overshadowed by the serious illness of our beloved King. The skies cleared and during the fall we gave a happy, affectionate and loyal welcome to his daughter, Princess Elizabeth and her husband, the Duke of Edinburgh. The ties of Empire or to use the modern phrase, the bonds of the Commonwealth, were strengthened and secured by their interest in our Country, the graciousness of their bearing, and the simpleness of their royalty.

"In February our gallant King died after years of suffering borne with the courage worthy of our Crown. Many tributes have been paid in highest praise. As Veterans we can say he lived as a Soldier and died as a Soldier. To our young, gracious Queen we tender the same loyalty, the same obedience and the same assurance that should recall, Canada will respond as in the past with all our strength.

"Legion efforts since our last convention have continued with steady determination. Success finally came in our efforts on behalf of the disability pensioner, Comrade Watts, our past Dominion President, spearheaded the attack and he gives a great proportion of the credit to the tireless and effective labours of Comrade Lumsden. The 33 1/3% increase in basic pension rate has proved a god-send to our disabled comrades.

"We are not able to report similar success with the battle for War Veterans allowances. The support of our efforts during the last session of Parliament does not suffice to quench our thirst for justice on behalf of V.V.A. recipients. The Legion knows that Canada's reward to those who have served her well and are now in unfortunate circumstances must be more than bare survival. Parliament recognized the fairness of our demand for pension increases commensurate with the cost of living. Parliament must recognize the exactly parallel case of war veterans allowance. The fight will be continued and must be continued until we succeed.

Dominion Convention

"Our Dominion convention in Montreal in May was an outstanding success. You have received a very full report in the Legionary on the scale and the scope of this really tremendous gathering of the Canadian Legion. Our Provincial delegation, while the smallest in the convention was one of the largest we have yet been able to muster. I was very proud of them. They took a very active part in committee work and the committee chairmen were very kind in their remarks on their attendance record.

ord at meetings and their active assistance in the committee debates and reports.

"They were also present at all debates on the convention floor. They worked hard, they played hard and they didn't disagree. I hope our representation at the next convention will be even larger. It is an experience which every Legion member should enjoy. I don't think anyone can really appreciate the strength and the quality of the Canadian Legion until he has attended a Dominion convention.

"And now to mention for a few moments the Provincial aspect of our Legion work. One of our first problems is membership. The picture here is brightening and I can report a 20% increase in our overall provincial membership this year. I can't emphasize too strongly that the responsibility for membership rests on the branch. Provincial Command is willing to help and has helped membership drives in the past year but each branch must establish and maintain an active membership committee.

"We can't stand still - we must go forward. We have great responsibilities and we must have the membership strength to sustain them. I appeal to all branches to work so that my successor can report another large increase in membership next year. Last year for the first time the Canadian Legion scholarship was awarded. A very brilliant young lady, Miss Margaret Ellis, daughter of the one and only Bay Ellis of O'Leary won the award. Miss Ellis' scholastic attainments at university (this year fully justified our committee's choice and she has our heartfelt congratulations and best wishes.

Zone System Recommended

"All branches which invited command officers to meetings and festivities received prompt acceptance of their invitations. We are delighted to go, we thoroughly enjoy the meeting and the festivities and we hope we have helped your branches by our attendance. I would recommend most strongly the active revival of the zone system. Perhaps that could be main policy for next year. It's impossible for the Provincial officers to get to every branch in a year, but it's good for a branch to have visitors and outside advice. It will strengthen the branches; it will increase the membership and I commend its possibilities to your new executive.

"Our Ladies' Auxiliaries throughout the Province have continued their branches. Those branches who have the good fortune to have Ladies' Auxiliaries heartily recommend the idea to their bachelor brethren. On behalf of the men I extend our thanks and best wishes to the Ladies' Auxiliaries of the Province.

"My report would not be complete if I failed to express my sincere thanks to the press and radio of this Province for their very generous support of our work. Poppy campaigns, membership drives and reports of activities are given wide coverage. The modern world de-

mands advertising and I think we have been accorded very kind treatment by the radio and the press in Prince Edward Island. We thank them most sincerely.

"Finally I would like to add my personal word of appreciation to you all. I have spent two very happy years as your Provincial President. I would not trade my experiences in office. Work in the Legion is very satisfying. I hope to continue my work in an unofficial capacity. I wish to thank all for your most excellent co-operation, support and patience with my shortcomings, especially Jimmy Walker who has had to suffer most in his capacity as Provincial Secretary. Jimmy does a first class job of work and no one knows it better than I.

"I wish you all success in the future and again my most sincere thanks for all you have done for me."
