Lewisville Cubs Win Two Games At S' side

The Lewisville Cubs won the first two games of a best-of-five series for the New Brunswick-Prince Edward Island junior baseball crown at Queen Elizabeth Park in Summerside yesterday, defeating the Curran & Briggs Juniors by scores of 13-1 and 17-10.

The next game is scheduled for Lewisville Saturday, and a double-header if necessary at the same place Sunday.

The home forces were out in the double-header, but contributed largely to their downfall by putting on what was probably their worst defensive display of the season. They committed eight errors in the first game and eleven in the second while the Cubs were playing steady ball with only three miscues in the opener and two in the second contest.

Roscoe Wilson let the Curran-Briggs down with five hits in the first game, while the Cubs were collecting 11 hits off Lefuragey on the mound for C. & B. Keith Bourgeois, smooth second sacker of the New Brunswick champs, led his team with 3 hits in 6 trips to the plate. Neil Walker was the only Curranite to get two base hits, Nelson and Wilson of the visitors hit home-runs, each with a mate aboard.

The second contest was a free-hitting affair on both sides, Lewisville touching Paul Schurman for 12 bingles while C. & B. collected 15 safe blows off Maddison and Cormier of the Cubs. C. & B. errors figured more largely in their defeat in the second game, their stumble-bum giving the Lewisville 10 unearned runs while only two of theirs were earned. The C. & B. boys were also guilty of some mental lapses which hurt their chances in the final encounter.

Keith Bourgeois was again the leading batter for Lewisville, getting five hits in six attempts. His brother Jackie was second with three hits in six tries. Maurice Cannon led the C. & B. attack with four bingles in five trips. Garnett Jones and Gord Grady each polled out round-trippers, each driving one runner ahead of him. The Lewisville infield all shone defensively. For the construction crew Neil Walker handled six chances flawlessly in the two games, and had but one error when he was bothered by the sun in a drive to left field by Mullins in the fourth inning of the second game.

Only One Player Traded At N.H.L. Draft Meeting

NEW YORK (CP)—Only one player changed hands at the National Hockey League draft meeting here Wednesday.

Johnny Goose McCormack, 28-year-old Edmonton-born centre, was picked up by Chicago Black Hawks for \$15,000 from Montreal Canadiens.

Chicago, having finished last in the league standings last season, got first choice. After the Hawks picked McCormack, the other clubs passed up their chances to draft anyone at the \$15,000 figure.

Under draft rules, each of the six NHL teams may protect two goalies and 18 other players. Remaining men on the roster are exposed to the draft.

The league governors also decided that the annual all-star game will be held Oct. 2 instead of Oct. 3 in Detroit. A league team coached by Frank (King) Clancy of Toronto will play Detroit Red Wings.

Marciano-Charles Bout Scheduled For Tonight

NEW YORK (AP)—The Marciano-Charles heavyweight title fight was postponed 24 hours Wednesday because of weather conditions.

The announcement was made by Jim Norris, president of the IBC, after a consultation with Robert Christenbery, chairman of the New York Athletic Commission, and the managers of the two fighters.

"An hour earlier Norris had said that the fight would be held Wednesday night if at all possible. Shortly after he spoke, it began to drizzle. Then came the decision to postpone."

The fighters will not weigh-in again but will have another physical examination today.

The weigh-in Wednesday was held before the postponement was announced.

At the weigh-in, both Rocky Marciano, and Ezzard Charles, were relaxed.

Marciano, the champion, was first on the scales. He weighed 186½, one pound less than he did last June 17 when he won a 15-round decision over Charles in their first encounter. Charles came in at 192½.

This is the heaviest Charles has

weighed. His previous high was 191½ on Aug. 11, 1953, when he lost a 10-round decision to Nino Valdes in Miami, and on June 5, 1952, when he lost in a title fight in Philadelphia to Jersey Joe Walcott.

Only twice have heavyweight championship fights been postponed because of weather in modern times. The first was the Joe Louis-Tommy Farr fight in 1937, and the second was the Louis-Walcott fight in 1948.

In discussing his high poundage Wednesday, Charles said: "I hope to put on even more weight — to give me power."

Before the June weigh-in—when Charles scaled only 185½ — the challenger did not eat breakfast. This time he had orange juice, a dry cereal, bacon and eggs, toast and marmalade, and tea.

Tom Tammis, co-manager of Charles, said he was "pleased with the weight. It's good. He'll be strong, and that's what he needs for Marciano."

U. K. Twins In Fight Debut

LONDON (AP)—Twin British heavyweights made their professional debut on a boxing show at Harringay Arena Tuesday night.

Henry Cooper of London knocked out Henry Painter of Andover in the first round. Twin brother Jim outpointed Dick Richardson of Newport, in six rounds.
