chilled gingered pears, or pumpkin cake, apple icing. Coffee or tea, milk.

All measurements are level. Pumpkin Cake: Cream together 1/2 c. butter or shortening and 1 1/2 c. sugar. Then cream in 2 well-beaten eggs and 1 c. sifted cooked fresh pumpkin (or canned or thawed frozen pumpkin or winter squash).

Sift together 2 c. already-sifted enriched flour, 3 tsp. baking powder, 1/2 tsp. salt, 1/2 tsp. baking soda and 1/2 tsp. each ground cinnamon, ginger and nutmeg. Add alternately with 4 c. milk to the first mixture.

Transfer to an oiled "x" 11" biscuit pan. Dust with 1 tsp. granulated sugar. Bake 40 min. in a mod. oven (375 degrees F.) or until a toothpick, when inserted in the center, comes out clean.

Slice and serve warm with butter, or cool, and frost with apple icing.

Apple Icing: In a pt. saucepan stir 1 c. sugar and 1-3 c. water. When dissolved, boil until the syrup forms threads when a little is dropped from a spoon.

Meantime, beat 1 egg white stiff. Beat the syrup slowly into it. Beat in 1 peeled and grated medium tart apple. Flavor with 1/2 tsp. orange extract; spread on the cake.
