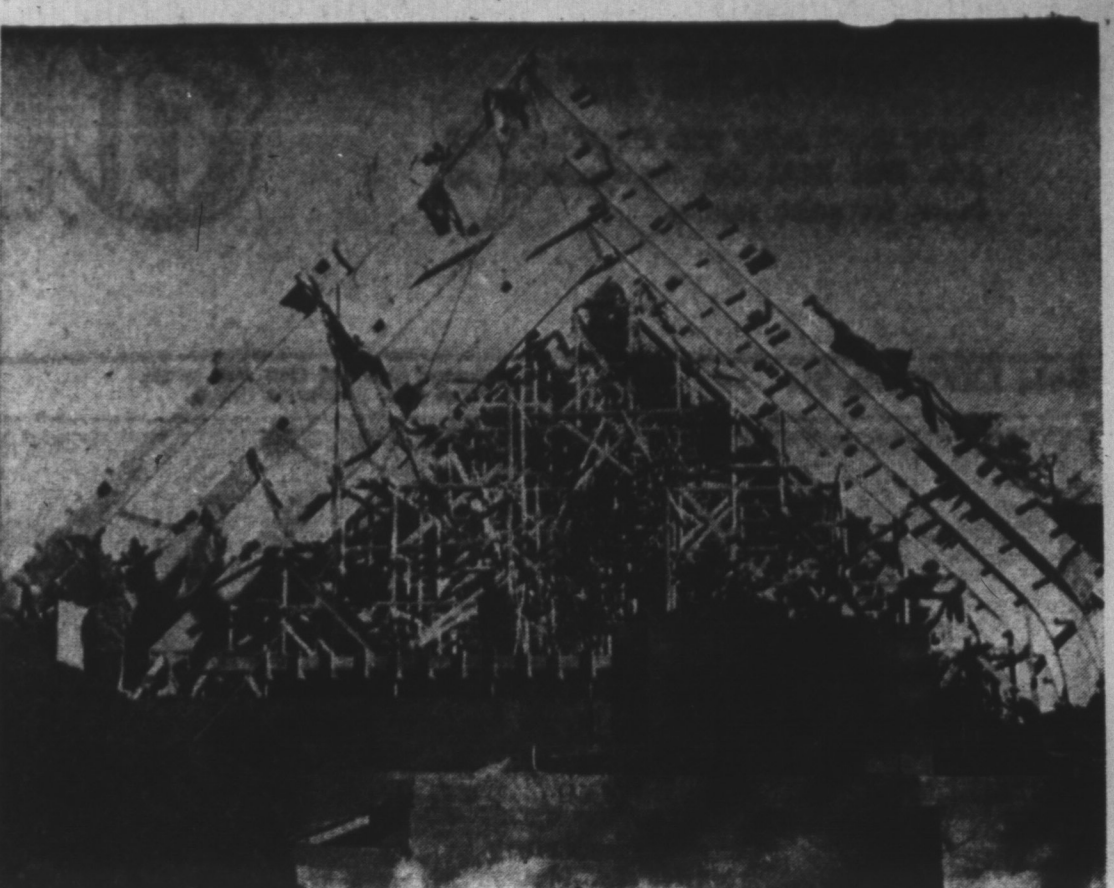


Plans Made For Enlarging Campsite At Augustine Cove

Park Estimates 188,824 Visitors

Competent estimates indicate that 188,824 persons visited Prince Edward Island's National Park during the 1959 tourist season, an increase of 13,400 in comparison with the number of visitors estimated to have visited the park during the same period last year.

Fleming Asks Report Probe

FREDERICTON (CP) — Formation of an international committee to study all aspects of the report of the international Passamaquoddy engineering board was suggested by Premier Fleming in a statement Wednesday.

The report on tidal power possibilities in the Maine - New Brunswick area was made public last Friday by the International Joint Commission. It said the Passamaquoddy project would be economically justified if built by the United States.

"The most interesting implications of the report for this province," said the premier, "concern the practical necessity of 'firming up' tidal power with supplies of conventional hydro power on the St. John River."

"Such a policy would be easily integrated with the present and future plans of the New Brunswick Electric Power Commission for development of the St. John River basin."

"I would emphasize that in the Passamaquoddy project, as a long-term project involving international jurisdiction, a comparatively long period of appraisal and negotiation lies ahead . . ."

Court Action Delayed On Yank's Steel Strike

PHILADELPHIA (AP)—Three federal appeal judges Thursday delayed enforcement of a Taft-Hartley injunction against the striking steelworkers and said they would decide some time next week whether to throw out the writ altogether.

Meanwhile the strike, now in its 15th week, continued.

The 80 - day injunction was granted in Pittsburgh Wednesday by Judge Herbert P. Sorg of U.S. district court. Immediately the Steelworkers Union appealed to the U.S. circuit court of appeals.

The appeals court heard arguments on two points:

Is the injunction granted under the Taft-Hartley Labor Act illegal?

Is the strike of 500,000 steelworkers endangering the health and safety of the United States?
