**Local and Other Items.**

**THE BRIGANTINE IRMA.**—Lynche's wrecking schooner is working at the stranded brigantine Irma at Thrum Cap, saving everything possible to remove. The vessel will probably be a total loss.—Halifax Herald.

**MILTON CHURCH.**—The new church at Milton will be opened for Divine service on Sunday the 30th inst. There will be three services: at 10.30, 3 p. m., and 7.30 p. m. A collection in aid of the building fund will be taken at each service.

**A SCHOONER FINED.**—A Sydney, C. B. despatch says: The schooner Petite Jeanne, St Pierre, Miq, which was seized last week for having contraband goods on board, has been released on payment of \$400, the captain signing an admission of the charge.

**SCOTT ACT.**—Before Stipendiary Magistrate Palmer on Tuesday, Geo O'Neill, of Vernon River, and John Finlay, of Vernon River Bridge, were convicted of violating the Scott Act and each was fined in the sum of \$50 and costs. A similar fine was imposed upon J. A. McIsaac, of Melville, a few days ago.

**ISLAND GIRL ABROAD.**—Amongst the names of the Canadian nurses who are honorably mentioned for caring for the American soldiers at Detention Camp, Montank Point, Long Island, is that of Gertrude E. Munn, of P. E. Island. Miss Munn is the second daughter of the late Dougald Munn, E. q., of Roseneath Mills, King's County.

**SUNDAY SCHOOL CONVENTION.**—The fifth annual convention of the Prince Edward Island Sunday School Association will be held in the Baptist Church, Charlottetown, P. E. I., on the 22nd and 23rd November. Every Sunday school in the province is expected to send one delegate. All ministers and S. S. superintendents are ex-officio members of the Convention. The delegates to the World's Sunday School Convention at London will report. An interesting time is expected.

**A WICKED GERM.**—The bubonic plague bacillus is a wicked germ to investigate. The other day Barisch, an assistant in a Viennese laboratory, was buried with the utmost precaution, he having shown every symptom of the plague before he died. Now Professor Nothke, his principal, and the two nurses who attended Barisch, are all down with the dreadful disease. All the professor's assistants have been inoculated, and the Government is taking every measure to prevent the spread of the plague.

**FIRE AND ROWDYISM.**—It is apparent, observes the Guardian, that some young men of Augustine Cove, or vicinity, are paving a way for a term in Dorchester. A few nights ago, a barn belonging to Mrs. Cameron, a widow, was burned to the ground, together with a horse, two pigs, three ducks, a set of new harness, a set of new working harness, 700 lbs of hay, etc. The fire is believed to be the work of incendiaries. On the same night four stacks of marsh hay were upset and some acts of rowdyism committed on the property of Donald Cameron.

Not seeing much ahead of him there he left for New York, where he worked some time, and subsequently was employed at Noank, Conn, and Bath, Me. He reports the coast overcrowded with people, and wages none too high. There are a good many Islanders there who are making a comfortable living but there are others again who would only be too glad to come home if they had the cash to take them.

It seems surprising that grocers should fight over the price of such a sweet thing as sugar.

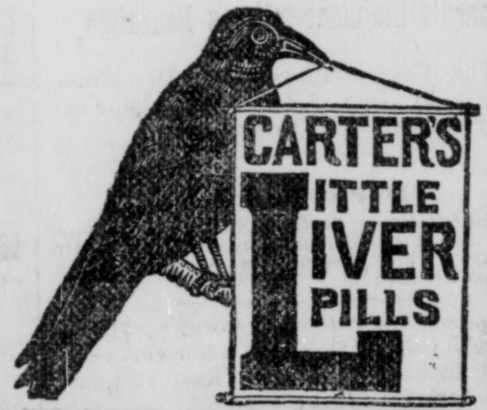
