Keen Interest In New School For Montague

Meetings held in Montague recently to discuss the inadequacy of the present high school, have caused considerable discussion among the people of the town. The most recent meeting was addressed by an architect who is an expert on school design and he outlined the plan of several smaller units, and the advantage of these over one large unit. The larger units have been used in N. S. and N. B. So far the meetings have been of the present planning committee, the board of school trustees, and the town council. What sufficient information has been obtained, the planning committee intends to call a general public meeting of the school district, and propose a final building committee to continue the project. In conversation with the chairman of the present committee, it was learned that the chief problem was whether to build a high school for the Montague school district only, or to build one that could accommodate high school pupils from a number of the surrounding school districts. He stated that while most of the discussions indicated favouring taking in the outlying districts, they could not reasonably pass the discussion stage until the Department of Education stated its policy regarding grade twelve and regional high schools.

MRS. JOHN MacQUARRIE

On Saturday evening, February 16, 1952, Charlottetown and surrounding communities were saddened by the passing away of Mrs. John MacQuarrie, aged 86 years. Mrs. MacQuarrie was the daughter of the late Robert Cudmore and Maria Fiddles of Appin Road, P. E. I., and the last of a family of twelve. Mrs. MacQuarrie lived at North Milton practically all her life and was well and favorably known. The deceased was a woman of fine Christian character, a faithful and valued member of the Fairview Baptist Church and for many years a member of the Missionary Society, moving to Charlottetown in 1928, where she resided until the time of her death. However, she was ever faithful in attendance at services until prevented by illness and during this period for more than three years and at numerous times had been confined to her bed where everything was done for her by kind hands and the attention of a devoted daughter. She had the great comfort of having her family and grandchildren visit her, whom she loved very much. Mrs. MacQuarrie passed away calmly and peacefully as she had lived. Her husband, the late John MacQuarrie, predeceased her 13 years ago. Two daughters and one son also predeceased her, as well as one infant son. The funeral service, which was held on Monday afternoon, February 18, from the Charlottetown Baptist Church with the Rev. J. D.
