



### DOWN THE BACK STRETCH

Earle Semple did not take long to display his speed wares at the Charlottetown oval. Last Saturday afternoon he cut the 5-year-old trotter Dean Gallon 3, 211 loose and a dozen watches were on him as he finished the mile easily in 2:13 2/5 and looked as though he could 2:10 if asked to in that notch. The previous best mile was by pacer—2:15. None of the other members of the stable were extended better than the 20-mark and Mary Merks' miles were around that figure, also to two others.

For the past couple of weeks a lot of favorable comments have been made about the 4-year-old pacer Suffolk Chief, owned by Cmdr. G. H. Buntin and in the stable of and being trained by Ed Downe. Last year he trained splendidly early in the season then wrenched his hind ankle and it bothered him all through the year. Now he is perfectly sound and about a week ago we timed him in the last quarter in 31 2/5, so were not surprised when on Tues-

day morning in company with Argot Pointer, Johnnie Kalmuck and Dean Swift he paced in 2:14 heading them all home. Johnnie was minus his hoppers and made a break on the last turn otherwise it would have been very close. Suffolk Chief is a full brother to Marilyn Chief 4, 2:02 1/2, and also of Elizabeth Chief 3, 2:09. He is a handsome black, free-legged horse with perfect manners and looks to be at least a 2:10 prospect.

Our readers will remember that Dick Logue, noted sportsman of Sydney, purchased several yearlings at Lexington sales. One of the highest priced was Banner by King's Counsel 158, dam, Direct Lady 2:07 1/2. These were placed in the stable of Sanders Russell of Stevenson, Alabama, and Waddy Carroll went down there to assist in training them. The City Slickers combined their

heavy artillery with Sonny Stull's pitching and the opponents' errors to defeat the Packers.

### IN THIS CORNER



The delegates representing the Islanders at the annual meeting of the Maritime Major Hockey League in New Glasgow on Sunday afternoon will vote to keep the local club in Major Series hockey. It is expected that the other three clubs, Halifax, Sydney and Glace Bay will vote to disband the four team league and return to Allan Cup competition. By voting to remain a Major Series Club the Islanders believe they will be allowed to retain ownership of the players they owned last year. The Islanders claim that the M.M.H.L. can't disband unless the vote is unanimous. Therefore Halifax, Glace Bay and Sydney can only withdraw from the league.

But the Islanders are also ready to join up in an Allan Cup league with Nova Scotia and New Brunswick teams. They don't want any part of the Cape Breton clubs and would prefer a league with Dartmouth, Halifax and New Glasgow. From here it looks like a fight between the Islanders and the Cape Breton Clubs to woo Halifax. The Atlantic hold the balance of power in the league at the moment. They can decide who goes and who stays by naming the circuit they would prefer to play in.

There are a number of setups which can be arranged for next winter's hockey. The M.M.H.L. could operate again or there could be two four-team leagues with the Islanders in either one of the New Brunswick or Nova Scotia leagues. Again there could be a Maritime Senior circuit between the leading clubs in each of the three Provinces or again there could be an Intermediate League.

There was every indication at the last meeting of the M.M.H.L. that the Islanders weren't wanted in Nova Scotia hockey. Maybe the feeling has changed somewhat by now around Halifax and Dartmouth. We know it isn't likely to change in Cape Breton. The delegates representing the Islanders at Sunday's meeting may have to be at their diplomatic best if they are to keep Charlottetown in the midst of the Maritime hockey picture.

Many of the top flight golfers at the Belvedere Golf Course will be competing in mainland tournaments over the week-end. Golf pro Cecil Dowling will be playing in the Nova Scotia Open at the Ashburn Golf Course while Bill Beer, Doug Saunders, Don MacDonald, Tom Rogers, Frank MacInnis, Bob Gray and Frank MacInnis plan to play in Moncton.
