RAILWAY EXTENSION.

The Honorable Mr. Scott, an influential member of Mr. Laurier's Cabinet, in the course of a speech on the address, to which reference has already been made, said:—

"It might be very proper, indeed, that additional railway accommodations should be given to Prince Edward Island; but I ask you, gentlemen, whether it would not be looked upon with grave suspicion, if four days before the expiration of Parliament, the government should bring down a proposal to tax and equip for all time to come, at the expense of this country, eight railways in the province of Prince Edward Island."

Hon. Mr. Prowse.—How many miles? Hon. Mr. Scott.—Only one hundred miles.

Hon. Mr. Scott.—I do not care what the distance was. I can quite understand that the member from Prince Edward Island should be anxious to have those railways built, but there were other places where railways were needed as urgently as in Prince Edward Island, and the policy of the government, as to railways all over the country, has been to stimulate private enterprise to aid in the building by giving a subsidy. The late government used to give a land subsidy sometimes, and sometimes a money subsidy; but ordinarily there was no very great objection to any railway that was in the public interest, and was supported at all events by a certain amount of private capital, receiving aid to the amount of \$3,200 per mile."

From the tenor of Senator Scott's remarks it is to be inferred that the present Government are opposed to the building and operating of branch railways in this Province, as Government works, at the cost of the Dominion. This is, under the circumstances, equivalent to a statement that we are not to have railway extension in this Province. It is to be hoped, however, that Hon. Mr. Davies will have sufficient influence in the Cabinet to procure the extension required by the people, or at least that part of it which he has distinctly promised to obtain. It is pleasing to note that Mr. Martin is ventilating the matter in the Lower House; and we have no doubt that he will continue to do so. The more the question is discussed in Parliament, the more will the hands of Mr. Davies be strengthened. The people of B. East and Murray Harbor want a railway, and they expect Mr. Davies to fulfill his pledge in that regard.

A STARTLING REPORT.

The Conservatives when in office were wont to refer important cases in dispute to Westminster. But if the reports be true, the Liberals are about to send to Rome. It is stated that the Government has purchased from Manitoba, as the price of a portfolio, certain concessions to the Roman Catholics of that province. At a recent meeting of the Greenway cabinet the bargain was ratified, and it is expected that Mr. Sifton will enter, by the grace of the electors of Brandon, into the enjoyment of the consideration. The able and well-informed Ottawa correspondent of the Mail and Empire says that he has been informed that "an emissary of the Laurier Government will leave immediately for Rome to ask from the Pope a ratification of the bargain. If acceptable to His Holiness, the terms of the agreement will be implemented; but if not, the threat of Mr. Laurier to enforce the constitution in its entirety, will be carried out. The whole question now hinges upon the view of the case which will be taken by Pope Leo XIII." We have no doubt that public opinion will agree with THE EXAMINER that Mr. Laurier would have done much better if he had let it hinge upon the final decision of the Queen's Privy Council. It is not to be supposed that His Holiness will accept terms less favorable to the minority in Manitoba than the law allows, or that which the Catholic people are willing to accept.

NOTES AND COMMENTS.

Mr. Blackett showed himself the true representative when he made application to Parliament on behalf of the poor people of Eggleston, who were in need of the fire. We hope that his application to the Government will not be in vain.

Conciliatory is made that the terms of the lucky Point ferry steamer was changed, last evening, from 10 o'clock to 6 o'clock, without any notice to the public. It is becoming too much the custom to conduct the public service without reference to the public.

The State elections in Vermont showed a decided gain for the Republicans. As the campaign was conducted on National lines this result would be a serious blow to the Democrats. Without doubt the voice of Vermont is the voice of New England. But how about the great West and South?

Mail and Empire: Mr. Thibault, one of the latest appointees to the Senate, was placed there because his father resigned in Quebec East and made way for Mr. Laurier, who had been defeated in Anticosti. Political favors, it seems, hereditary. It is to be hoped that the old law of primogeniture has been duly observed.

Montreal Gazette: Mr. Laurier justified the dismissal of Mr. Davies of public employees who made themselves "offensive" by supporting Conservative candidates at the recent election. Mr. Laurier's admiration for the United States evidently extends to the "spies" system which flourishes there.

British Colonist: If the position of Minister of the Interior is not held out to Manitoba as a bribe, why has it not been filled long ago?

Moncton Times: The receipts of the United States government during August were twenty-five and a half million dollars and the expenditures thirty-six millions. The deficit for the month is therefore ten and a half millions, and for the two months of the current fiscal year it is over twenty-three millions. This is the third year of tariff reform in the neighboring country. If Mr. Laurier's government is wise it will stick to the National Policy under which Canada has done so well. The country can stand an exhibition of grit incomparably better than one of tariff blundering.

PARLIAMENT OF CANADA. An Exchange of Courtesies. Tarte Denounced by French Liberals. OTTAWA, Sept. 5. When the House of Commons opened yesterday, Hon. Mr. Fielding requested the Opposition to permit the immediate passage of a grant for militia camps.

Mr. Foster courteously consented, and \$450,000 were voted in a few seconds. The debate on the Address continued until 11 o'clock, when an adjournment took place until Monday.

The French Liberal members held a caucus yesterday, at which there were some lively scenes. Several members were vigorously for Mr. Tarte for dismissing government employees, whose families were now in consequence in slight poverty. The dismissals were all on political grounds.
