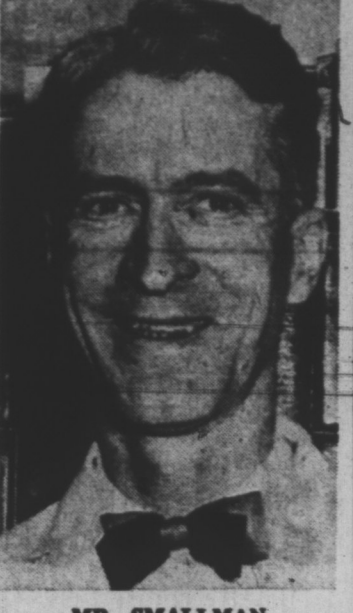


P. E. I. Rehabilitation Council Names New Slate Of Officers

Laidlaw; executive commissioner of Red Cross Miss I. Arsenault.

Legislation Is Sought For City

The City of Charlottetown will seek a right of way across property of HMCS Queen Charlotte in order to lay sewer which will empty in the Hillside River.

Before a petition seeking the necessary legislation could be presented to the House, Hon. B. Earle MacDonald had to ask that rule 63 be suspended. Rule 63 provides for notice to be made in the Royal Gazette for a given period of time before any private bill can be introduced to the legislature.

Premier Matheson suggested that the promoter explain why he was asking for the suspension of the rule and what the bill was about.

Mr. MacDonald said the City Council like many individuals finds itself in trouble. They want to extend their sewer line they found it necessary to infringe on certain land now occupied by HMCS Queen Charlotte. The proposal is to close off the end of Water Street formerly used by farmers to land from the ice and construct a new slip at the foot of Sydney Street.

Mr. MacDonald recalled that the City Council had not played ball with him and other members of the Government in the past and he could quite easily refuse to introduce the measure.

"However I realize it is not the City Council I am doing this for, but for the people of Charlottetown. The bill must be passed," Mr. MacDonald said.

"I can't see anything wrong with the bill except its lateness. However I found out they couldn't do much about this since the engineers just discovered this difficulty when they came to look the work over recently."
