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Says 98 Per Cent Teaching By Fear

TORONTO, (CP)—Teaching by fear exists in 98 per cent of schools and colleges in the United States and Canada, Dr. Nathaniel F. Cantor, chairman of the departments of anthropology and sociology, Buffalo University, said Friday.

Speaking to suburban York West Home and School Council, Dr. Cantor said: "I believe teachers of Canada fear their principals; principals fear their supervisors; supervisors fear the provincial authorities and the authorities fear the parents—just as they do in the United States."

This fear, he said, communicated itself to the pupils in the classroom and "with fear pupils lose the tremendous creativity they have as small children."
