Asking Milwaukee To Double Salary

Grant Grady & Thane Doyle Suspended By League Exec.

Two more suspensions were handed out at a special meeting of the Island Senior Hockey League executive held last night.

Grant Grady, defenseman of Summerside Aces, has received an indefinite suspension pending further investigation into an incident occurring during the Montague-Summerside game Friday night and goaltender Thane Doyle of Basiliac Youth Club has been suspended for one game.

Grady's suspension resulted from an attempted attack on a referee during the Montague-Aces game and Doyle's suspension is a result of his throwing his stick into the stands in the last minute of the B.Y.C.-Parkdale game at the Arena Thursday.

The latest pair of suspensions brings the total so far this year to four. Last week both Dick Carroll and Phil MacGee of Montague were given suspensions.

Both Carroll and Doyle will sit out Thursday's game at the Arena between Montague and B.Y.C.

MOBILE Ala. (AP) — Outfielder Hank Aaron said Monday he is asking the Milwaukee Braves to double his salary.

The Mobile Negro youth said he is asking for a salary of "between \$30,000 and \$34,000." He made between \$15,000 and \$17,000 last season when he won the National League batting championship with an average of .328.

"I think I helped the team last season and I think I can help them even more this year," Aaron said.

Taylor Won \$215,000 To Top Canadian Racing In 1956

 TORONTO (CP) — Whoever coined the phrase "I'm what I am, gits," could have had Toronto sportsman — industrialist Edward Plunkett Taylor in mind. E. P. certainly has it, "gits" it — and spends it.

The King Midas of Canadian racing was the country's leading money winner in 1956 with earnings of more than \$215,000. His string of Canadian-bred thoroughbreds picked up \$158,840 in purses and his wife's comparatively small stable added \$61,165. All earnings were made on Ontario tracks.

But it wasn't all gravy for the handsome Ottawa - born financier who celebrates his 56th birthday today. He has the largest stable in Canada and the monetary returns are regarded as insignificant for his vast operation.

NO. 1 BREEDER
 A source close to Taylor said that probably most of his purse earnings have been funnelled right back into what racetrack folks term "improvement of the breed."

Taylor is the recognized No. 1 horse breeder in the country, an undertaking he started in earnest seven years ago.

He owns the fashionable 600-acre Windfields Farm on the outskirts of Toronto, one of the largest breeding and training establishments in North America with a horse population of about 200, plus prize Angus cattle. In addition, he owns the National Stud at Oshawa, Ont., operated chiefly for the use of small owners.

There's little doubt he has added considerably to the improvement of the breed, and at great personal expense. When he took over the late R. S. McLaughlin's Parkwood Stables at Oshawa in 1950 for his National Stud he estimated his losses would be \$100,000 a year for three years.

Taylor-bred horses have dominated the Canadian racing scene since 1949. They've won the classic Queen's Plate for Canadian-bred three-year-olds six of the last eight years, although only three

Daffy Dodgers Hire Clown To Ease Tension At Ebbetts Field

BROOKLYN (AP) — The daffy Dodgers, whose outfielders sometimes get hit on the head with a fly ball and whose base runners have been known to wind up three on a bag, have decided they don't get enough laughs—so they have hired a clown.

With a completely straight face, Walter O'Malley, president of the Brooklyn Baseball Club, announced Monday that he had signed Emmett Kelly, renowned clown of the Ringling Brothers Circus.

Kelly's new job won't be to play baseball, O'Malley was quick to add, but, as he put it "to ease the tension at Ebbetts Field."

The bulbous-nose laugh-getter will perform for the Dodgers strictly in character—that is, in his tattered suit and with the soulful, forlorn look that has brought guffaws from millions.

Kelly will join the club at spring training quarters in Vero Beach, Fla. He will make appearances at Miami and at other places where the team plays in exhibitions.

WILL TRAVEL TOO
 He also will join the faculty of the Dodgers' baseball school, preceding the actual training period. During the season he will be on the field before the games, helping amuse the customers.

O'Malley announced Kelly's services would not be confined to the parent club.

The clown also will make visits to farm clubs such as Montreal, St. Paul and Fort Worth where, the Brooklyn boss implied, people need to laugh some, too.

Kelly was with the Ringling Brothers Barnum and Bailey Circus for 36 years and became the most famous of all clowns. He led the group last spring as the outgrowth of a union dispute.

Pancho Gonzales Makes Runaway Of Tennis Series

WELLINGTON, New Zealand (AP)—Pancho Gonzales is turning the New Zealand professional tennis series with Australia's Ken Rosewall into a runaway.

The pro champion from Los Angeles trounced the little Aussie Davis Cup ace again Monday 16-14, 6-4, 9-7. It was the American's seventh victory in eight matches in the 100-match series.

Most of Monday's action was packed into the long first set which was a battle of Gonzales' serving power and Rosewall's backcourt finesse, particularly his sharp passing backhand.

There wasn't a service break until the 21st game, with the score 10-10. Pancho cracked Rosewall's delivery but proceeded to lose his own in the next game, sending the match to the 29th game before there was another break.

Gonzales broke in the 29th, then held service for the set. The Australian dropped his service twice in the second set and twice in the third.

SHEFFIELD, England (AP) — Cecilia Berkes, Hungary's Olympic canoeing star, was reunited Monday with her husband Julian after fleeing Budapest by hiding under a train seat.

Julian arrived here last November and wrote to his wife to leave the Hungarian team while he was traveling home from Melbourne or to stay in Australia.

Mrs. Berkes said she didn't receive the letter and believes that Communist officials with the team intercepted it. She learned about her husband's flight to the West only upon returning to Budapest.

"I had to leave our two-year-old son behind," she told newspaper men. "The weather was bad, and I could not bring him with me. It mars the happiness I have in being in this country, and with my husband."

MAKE HISTORY IN LONDON

Flying Curlers Winning Many Friends For Canada

London (special) — The return to the Olympic roster of curling — one of the few remaining really amateur sports — would probably be welcomed more enthusiastically in the Maritimes than anywhere else. The "roarin' game" is a great international game as Maritimers see it. Sixty-four of them have been winning many friends for Canada on this side of the water in matches in Scotland, England and now in Switzerland.

The Canadian curlers in their bright, badge-covered sweaters and Scottish bonnets invaded the Richmond Ice Rink in suburban London a few days ago for a series of friendly matches that probably made sports history. It is believed that this was the first group of Canadians to come to London for curling. Their manner of coming has impressed followers of the game here as much as their enthusiasm and skill.

TYPICALLY CANADIAN
 Formation of the Maritime Flying Curlers' Club is seen here as a typically Canadian idea — based on a desire to share common interests with people in other places and never to let mere distance be a barrier in good friendship. The fact that the largest delegation is from Prince Edward Island, the smallest province, serves to emphasize the air-mindedness of Canadians in general and Maritimers in particular.

The 36 curlers from P.E.I. 20 from Nova Scotia and 18 from New Brunswick arrived by DC-4 in Prestwick, Scotland, last Friday and then in Edinburgh on Saturday and Monday. After spending Tuesday and Wednesday in London, they left for Paris on Thursday and were scheduled to reach St. Moritz on Sunday. After the Swiss matches there will be time for some European sight-seeing before the Maritime Central Airways plane leaves Prestwick on February 10.

Many of the curlers have family links with Scotland although for some they go back many generations.

While some like Dr. E.S. Giddings, of Charlottetown, could look back to forebears who left Scotland a couple of centuries ago, James Laidlaw, of Saint John, N.B. and Dr. William Vaughan, of Halifax, were born in Scotland, the former near Glasgow and the latter in Edinburgh.

CHARTER MEMBERS
 J.F. MacLeod, of Charlottetown, organizer of the tour, and J.D. Alexander, of Campbellton, N.B., like Dr. Giddings, are charter members of the Flying Curlers' Club, formed in 1948. Since then they have swung their brooms in Vancouver, Detroit, Chicago, Boston and New York.

Traditional Scottish hospitality greeted the Canadian curlers in Glasgow and Edinburgh. Roy Thomson, owner of the Scotsman, entertained them at a cocktail party in the North British Hotel.

Edinburgh, where they met leading curlers from that part of the country.

In Scotland the Maritimers met and played against some curlers who had made Canadian tours in recent years. Their opponents were already aware of the great strides curling had taken in Canada. Play was about even, the Flying Curlers reported on reaching London. No championship was at stake, and the make-up of various rinks was changed from time to time to give all members of the touring group a chance to play.

The Canadians were accustomed to using eight perfectly matched rocks for each rink and found that this was not usual in Scotland.

PLAY "DRAW GAME"
 Scottish curlers, they found, played almost exclusively the "draw game", while the Maritimers as usual employed their own combination of the "draw game" and the "running game."

Scottish skill with the push broom impressed the Canadians who employed as usual their long straw brooms.

Two veteran curlers in the party are Dr. I.A. Johnstone and Dr. Preston McIntyre, both of Montague, P.E.I. Dr. McIntyre met the chief of the McIntyre clan in Edinburgh.
