NOTES FROM THE CAPITAL.

Inside Service to be Attacked.

Lobster Season Extended.

OTTAWA, July 13.—A startling rumor is current in the parliament buildings, affecting the older members of the inside service. It is to the effect that the government has decided to superannuate all officers over sixty years of age. If this be true, it would apply to three deputy ministers, namely Colonel Panet, deputy Minister of Militia, Colonel White, deputy Postmaster General and Mr. Parmelee of the department of Trade and Commerce.

Hon. Mr. Fielding, as acting Minister of Marine and Fisheries has revoked the action of Sir Louis Henry Davies, decided upon just previous to the Minister's departure, and decided to extend the season for the catching of lobsters in places where it would expire on July 15th, for nine days—that is up to and including Saturday, July 24th.

THE PAPAL DELEGATE.

Leaves for Rome on Saturday.

TORONTO, July 13.—Mgr. Merry del Val leaves for Rome on Saturday. It has been stated, on good authority, that Mgr. del Val's report will be against the settlement of the School Question made by the Laurier Government.

Railway Men Dismissed.

QUEBEC, July 13.—The Canadian Jubilee contingent arrived yesterday in the steamer Scotsman.

Thirteen out of fourteen of the Intercolonial Railway employes at Point Levis were discharged today. Ten employes at Chaudiere were also discharged.

Russia's Imperial appanages, constituting the domain reserved for the support of the younger branches of the Imperial family, which was begun by Emperor Paul I., now comprises 21,000,000 acres, with a revenue of \$10,000,000 a year. The Department of Appanages is the largest land-owner, farmer, and wine producer in the Empire, and is developing timber, sugar, and cotton industries on a very large scale. It is distinct from the private possessions of the Romanoffs and from the state or Crown demesnes.

COLLEGE BOY ON THE WAR PATH.

SIR.—What's the matter with Fred Peters and the Prince of Wales College? Was he playing a game of bluff on the students for an election dodge when he got them to circulate petitions over the country getting their fathers', brothers' and friends' names, with a promise to give them a new College as a bribe to vote for a one-horse power government, and secure the votes of the members to get a \$30,000 dollar debate re for the election?

Tenders were advertised and called for up to June 1st, and up to this time have not been awarded! Is it a fact, as rumor has it, that the plans are in such a condition that the one-man government, run by Fred. Peters, is ashamed to award it to Schurman & Co. who are reported to have the lowest tender? What is the matter with the one-man government? Is it that the plans don't suit the specification or the specification don't suit the plans? Or is it that some of the material specified to be used in the construction is so flimsy that it would not be safe to put the Students into the building after it was completed? Is it that the levels or grades for a foundation are in the same condition as the levels and grades of the new wing to the asylum, where the work cannot be proceeded with? Will Mr. Peters rise and explain his conduct to the country, or is he ashamed to let the people know about the elaborate residence he is providing for Dr. Anderson at the people's expense? The area of the floors of the whole building is 18,000 feet, and Dr. Anderson's own elaborate private apartments will take over 4,000 feet, leaving only 14,000 feet for all the class rooms, corridors, lecture rooms, cloak rooms, etc., and as the building will cost the country \$30,000 when completed, what right has the one-man government to expend over six thousand dollars of the people's money for a private residence for an imported gentleman, and also providing him with fire, lights, and other perquisites? The next thing the people will be asked to do is to furnish this gentleman's apartments! If it is necessary, as Mr. Peters says, to build a new College, which I have my doubts about, why not build one for the students only, and let Dr. Anderson provide a residence for himself out of his high salary, as other professors have to do. I contend that we do not want a new college while the finances of the country are in such a condition as they have been placed by the one-man government. The present building is quite large enough by the removal of Dr. Anderson from his living apartments and with an expenditure on the present building of one thousand dollars will give ample room for years to come, and thereby be a saving to the country of \$29,000 or is the petition which was concocted by the Peters government and circulated by the students and their friends, the preparation of plans and specification and the passage of the act to issue debentures, and the calling for tenders, a huge humbug, so as to place funds in the hands of the one-man government to be squandered for political purposes in the same manner as the \$15,000 which was voted for the repairs of the provincial building was? How is it that the Guardian, of June 18th, 1897, in giving an elaborate description of the college did not give an account of the gorgeous, magnificent and elaborate apartments Dr. Anderson is provided in the specification. Was it suppressed by the leader of the government to gull the people of this province? These are questions for the honorable Fred. Peters and his organs to answer before the 21st.

COLLEGE BOY FOOLED.

LATEST NEWS BY WIRE AND MAIL

PITTSBURG, July 11.—There is no change in this section regarding the coal miner's strike. 18,000 men are idle in this district.

LONDON, July 11.—It is announced that the Anglo Egyptian expedition is to be increased to ten thousand men. The column will capture Omdurman and rescue D. rufur, Kordofan, Semma, Bahr el Ghazal and other places. A portion of the front will advance along the Khartoum side of the Nile.

MONTREAL, July 11.—It looks now as if the preferential clause were doomed and there is a rumor that Sir Wilfrid Laurier has so cabled his colleagues. Mr. Tarte's paper has also an inspired article saying that if England does not renounce the treaties made with Germany and Belgium, Canada will have to reconstruct her trade policy. We offered the preferential clause to England, says Mr. Tarte, but to no other countries.

OTTAWA, July 11.—A great municipal sensation has been created by the resignation of eight alderman of the capitol as a protest against the purchase of two American fire engines in preference to Canadian. The Waterous Engine Works Co., in Brantford, are willing to put their engine against any American engine, but a majority of the council put the deal through. The minority challenge the others to test the matter at the polls.

Australia continues to be ravaged by the rabbit pest. All efforts to exterminate it have failed. In seven years New South Wales has expended over \$4,000,000 in fighting the pest, while since 1890, 956 miles of barrier rabbit-proof fence has been erected. But to little purpose. And what is most alarming is that the rabbit is reported to be developing new and alarming capacities. It can climb trees and fences, crawl through the meshes of wire fences supposed to be rabbit proof, and generally triumph over all the artsemployed against it. Queensland is trying, with great patience, to enlist battalions of microbes in the warfare against the all-invading rabbit. The bacillus of Pasteur's chicken cholera is cultivated and concealed in pellets of pollard, and these are to be scattered over the country.
