

News Highlights Of Week Are Discussed By Writer

Summary of the week: Premier Duplessis died. British voters will elect a new parliament next month. The United Nations decided to send a fact-finding mission to Laos.

NEW CHIEF FOR QUEBEC
Schefferville is a small mining town in the area of an open-pit iron-ore development in a desolate part of northeastern Quebec that was once known as the Land of Cain.

The big development scheme was one of many that Maurice Duplessis promoted in his last 15 years as Le Chef of the province's Union Nationale government.

Duplessis suffered a stroke Thursday before last during a visit to Schefferville. He remained in a coma for 3½ days and died early Monday. His body was buried at Trois-Rivières where he was born 69 years ago.

His death marks a turning point for Quebec. For almost a generation in Duplessis dominated Quebec law-making. He wielded personal power over most phases of the administration and in the minds of many, he himself was the government.

As expected, 52-year-old Paul Sauvé was the Union Nationale's choice to succeed Duplessis. Of late, Duplessis had been giving increasingly important jobs to Sauvé who was youth and social welfare minister before being sworn in Friday.

Premier Sauvé chose a 20-man cabinet little changed from the previous administration.

BREXIT ELECTION
Prime Minister Macmillan may not have planned it, but the Labour party at a disadvantage when he flew to Scotland to advise the Queen to dissolve Parliament so that a general election can be held Oct. 5.

Hugh Gaitskell, the Labour party leader, and Aneurin Bevan, the Socialist spokesman on foreign affairs, were in Moscow on a visit. They returned hastily to London for the campaign.

The election day announcement also torpedoed the annual Labour party conference which was to have been held at Blackpool. The MPs will be too busy with last-minute speeches to attend that.

Macmillan is offering British voters a choice of participants in "important international negotiations" that lie ahead—meaning a summit conference. The Conservatives consider this as one of their leading advantages. They say that Macmillan's visit to Moscow last winter started the present round of East-West discussions.

Public opinion polls and a prosperous economy are also cited by Conservatives confident of a rare three-in-a-row victory at the polls.

TRADE GAP WIDEN
Foreign trade for the first seven months of the year, Canada bought far more overseas than she sold.

The difference was more than twice the size of the trade deficit in the first seven months of 1958 — nearly \$460,000,000 against nearly \$190,000,000.

TO VISIT DAOS
Overriding Soviet objections, the Security Council voted 10 to 1 to send a UN fact-finding group to Laos. Representatives of Italy, Argentina, Japan and

Tunisia were to begin action this weekend of charges by the Southeast Asian country that it is the victim of Communist aggression from North Vietnam.

The move is less than the Laotian government asked for. It wanted a UN emergency force to help combat Communist rebels in the guerrilla fighting.

During the week, Laos continued to report small-scale fighting in its northern provinces. Officials believe the Communists may be preparing to begin a big attack on the town of Samneua.

INDIA, CHINA AND TIBET
An appeal for an end to China and India's dispute over border violations came from an unexpected source this week—the Soviet Union.

The Russians, acting the role of peacemaker, urged the two giants of Asia to end their differences "in the spirit of friendship." The Soviet appeal was made because "certain circles" in the West were trying to complicate the situation before Premier Khrushchev goes to Washington next week.

Both the Chinese and Indian governments declared they were ready to negotiate.

Perhaps trying to avoid further words with Peking, the Indian government told the Dalai Lama that it still regards Tibet as part of China. The Dalai Lama says his country is independent and is trying to have the UN look into Communist China's seizure of Tibet.
