

# B.Y.C. Clobbers Shamrocks 12-5

## Hart, Turner Battle Tonight

PHILADELPHIA (AP)—Garnet (Sugar) Hart and Gil Turner, longtime sparring mates, fight "for real" in a scheduled 10-round bout tonight. It could be one of the year's outstanding action bouts.

The two ranking welterweights were brought up in the same section of Philadelphia. They began their fist-duelling more than five years ago when Hart was known as "Skinny," and Turner was one of the hottest fighters in the welter division.

Those encounters were little more than exercise for Turner and lessons for Hart, who scaled off 110 pounds.

But Hart, 22, now is ranked No. 4 by the National Boxing Association among the challengers to welterweight champion Virgil Akins. Ring Magazine lists him No. 5.

Turner, 27, is No. 6 in the NBA listings and No. 7 in the Ring ratings. He is by far the more experienced with a record of 55 wins, including 35 knockouts, 17 losses and one draw in 73 bouts.

# Redlegs Shutout Giants; Red Sox Whip Tigers 9-4

Bob Purkey pitched a brilliant six-hitter and big Steve Bilko walloped a two-run homer as Cincinnati Redlegs beat San Francisco Giants 3-0 Monday.

That was the only game scheduled in the National League.

Three night contests were played in the American League. Chicago was at Washington, Cleveland at Baltimore and Detroit at Boston.

The Giants hung to first place by three percentage points as the rest of the National League had the day off.

The victory moved the Redlegs into third place, 3 1/2 games behind the Giants and three games

back of Milwaukee.

Only two Giants reached third base off Purkey. He struck out three and did not issue a walk.

ANTONELLI'S LOSS  
Giant southpaw Johnny Antonelli was charged with the loss. Bilko put all 245 pounds behind Johnny Antonelli's fourth-inning pitch and the ball hit the top row of the left centre field bleachers.

Pete Whisenand, at second on Jim Finigan's throwing error, scored ahead of Bilko. His 400-foot shot was Bilko's fourth homer of the year.

The Redlegs picked up their third run in the seventh when Don Hoak singled, went to second on Ed Bailey's sacrifice and scored on a single by Eddie Miksis. Bob Speake, the Giant left fielder, threw out Miksis trying to stretch his hit into a double.

WASHINGTON (AP)—An apparently impending Chicago White Sox victory was washed out when rain caused postponement of Monday night's game here with the White Sox leading Washington Senators 7-1 in the top of the fourth inning.

Erased from the records were three straight hits by Billy Goodman of the Sox and a home run by Chicago's Tito Francona. The game was called off after a delay of one hour.

BOSTON (AP)—The surging Boston Red Sox swept to their sixth straight victory by defeating Detroit Tigers 9-4 Monday night with a six-run third inning featured by Jackie Jensen's 14th homer.

Jensen's three-run blast snapped a 2-2 deadlock and helped move the Red Sox into a virtual second place tie with Kansas City, 7 1/2 games behind the front-running New York Yankees.

After Jensen's loft into the bullpen, a pair of walks, a double by Don Buddin and a single by Pete Runnels brought in three more runs and gave right hander Frank Sullivan a big cushion. He went on to gain his third victory against one loss.

Paul Foytack, the first of four Detroit pitchers, was charged with the loss, his fifth in 10 decisions.

BALTIMORE (AP)—Billy O'Dell pitched almost perfect baseball after a shaky first inning start as Baltimore Orioles whipped Cleveland Indians 5-2 Monday night.

The 25-year-old southpaw gave up just two singles in the final 8 1-3 innings and one of those base runners was erased on a double play as O'Dell faced only one batter over the minimum during that span.

After retiring the first two men in the first, O'Dell gave up his only walk of the game to Minnie Minoso. Rocky Colavito followed with a single to centre and both runners scored on a double down the left field line by J. W. Porter.

The next 16 consecutive Cleveland batters were retired before Colavito opened the seventh inning with another single.

## Jersey Joe Breaks Up Brawl

CAMDEN, N.J. (AP)—Jersey Joe Walcott, former world heavyweight champion, broke up a brawl among a mainly teen-age crowd after a Saturday night dance.

Roughnecks had set upon a rookie cop, armed but out of uniform, thrown away his pistol and started to maul him.

Policeman William Reeves, 26, had taken his wife to the dance. As they left, the youths were scrapping in the street. Reeves tried to break up the fight but was attacked. His face was cut and his legs were bruised.

Walcott, a special officer with the city's juvenile bureau, and a fellow officer waded in and with the help of another off-duty policeman subdued the brawlers.

Three of the youths were arrested.

Boudreau certainly is high on the 21-year-old infielder and puts his praise in these words: "It's too early to compare Mazeroski with Joe Gordon. Bill is just getting started. Joe was a star for many, many years. But I'll have to tell you that Mazeroski has a chance to be every bit as good as Gordon. Certainly, he's the best second baseman in the league right now."

From a guy like Lou Boudreau, that's quite a tribute for the youngster.

Tony Kubek is a New York Yankee who has played five different positions for defending American League champions and done all in championship style. Indeed Tony is mentioned as the next Yankee great.

Tributes from fellows like Mickey Mantle and Stan Musial definitely should make a young man like Mr. Kubek feel pretty good.

Teammate Mantle says "It took me years to learn how to play centre field and he goes out there and owns it from the very first day."

Musial, who knows a wee bit about batters and batting has this comment to make. "Kubek hits singles and doubles because he thinks of himself as a singles and doubles hitter. As soon as he begins to think of himself as a long ball hitter, he'll get his home runs. He has the power right now. He pulls as much right as I did in my first couple of years. Give him another year or two to find out a little more about the pitchers, and he'll find the homers coming."

But the tribute we really got a bang out of came from manager Casey Stengel. Casey puts it in real Stengel fashion. "I know he can go from first to third for me and hit behind the runner for me, all of which you will not find in the record book. If you open it up, along with his age and height and weight.

"Here's a boy which he sits on the bench without opening his mouth so you'll know which side he's on. But—you know something?—when he goes out on the field you know."

Now, what did the man say?

Ryne Duren, New York Yankees' relief artist, from Cazeno-va, Wisconsin, has been ruled eligible for the American League's rookie of the year award. Previously it was thought that he had accumulated more than the 45 innings of major league pitching prior to this season. A check disclosed that he had pitched 44 2-3 innings and had been in the majors less than the 45 day limit.

Duren is quite the fireman and should give the award quite a battle.

Art MacKenzie was really in top form at Belvedere Golf Course over the week-end.

Art shot a blistering 70 the exact same score that Stan Leonard was chalking over the Mayfair course in Edmonton. Of course it's nothing new for Art to come up with great performances but this showing so early in the season might serve as an indication that he is in for his greatest season.
