

# Four Tignish Youths Are Sternly Warned

SUMMERSIDE — Four Tignish youths were given their freedom yesterday, following a stern warning about their behaviour by Magistrate W. Chester S. MacDonald, after serving three months in Prince County jail for breaking into the Alberion liquor store last February.

Three of the men still face other charges until Sept. 17, but were charged more charge. The four, Wilfred Joseph Richard, Gerald James Hayward, Paul Joseph Busto, and Edwin Joseph DesRoches told Magistrate MacDonald, after questioning, they had learned their lessons after their three month stay in jail which they stated they didn't care for.

The magistrate told them he was deferring sentence on the other charges until Sept. 17, but warned the quartet that if they got into any trouble they would be brought back and sentenced to penitentiary on the charges still facing them. Magistrate MacDonald also warned the young men that the Tignish policeman is in authority and if there is any report of non-cooperation by the group with the constable they would be brought back to court and sentenced to the federal penitentiary.

Audrey Bessie MacLeod, of Wellington was fined \$30 and costs for creating a disturbance on the school teacher placing in a lower grade.

Morley M. Bell, Q.C. represented the school board in the prosecution. Magistrate MacDonald ordered the three month alternative in Mrs. MacLeod's case as well.

Charges arose as the result of the school teacher placing two children in the school in a lower grade.

Norman Gallant, St. Hubert, was fined \$100 and costs for possession of a quantity of illicit barley which has proven in recent yields.

Cpl. Calvin Bunsay told the court that during a search of the Gallant premises a 12 ounce bottle of illicit spirits was found as well as a gallon jug that smelled strongly of spirits. The alternative was 30 days.

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need tests that it outyields all other known varieties. A top yield of 70.3 bushels per acre was recorded in 1962 in a test plot of two and one-half acres by Carlyle Ramsey, Alberion in an experiment conducted by Canada Packers in co-operation with the provincial department of agriculture. Other yields included reports of 67.6 bushels per acre, 68.1 bushels and 62 bushels. Two other test plots that produced 48.8 bushels and 46.3 bushels were late in harvesting owing to the unusually wet weather last fall.

Cerealist R. B. MacLaren, Experimental Farm, reports that Herta has consistently outyielded all other varieties in tests they have made at the farm, though definite per-acre yields were not available.

"We have been recommending Herta as being better in a pure stand of barley," says Mr. MacLaren who explains that it does not seem to do well as a competitor in a mixed grain crop. It is also not recommended in a field that is being seeded down, Mr. MacLaren said.

Yields of Herta obtained here last year on selected plots compare with the Dominion Bureau of Statistics average estimate of 43 bushels per acre last year. In normal years the average runs more like 37 bushels, an agricultural spokesman stated yesterday. It was 37.1 in 1961, for example.
