Stock Market Drive Stalls, General Selling Withheld

NEW YORK (AP)—The stock market's 1965 drive to historic peaks stalled last week, but there was no general selling. In fact, by the middle of the week, popular market averages stood at record peaks. The retreat from these peaks was slight.

Corporate news of earnings, dividends, stock splits and the like continued to provide encouraging news. But the prices of stocks had discounted much of this in the four previous weeks of steady advance.

At the same time, there was further concern about the monetary situation, underlined by a loss of \$100,000,000 in U.S. gold holdings. President de Gaulle's proposals for a world monetary system more closely linked to gold rather than the dollar and the pound sterling, and also some worry in financial circles about possible credit tightening moves by the U.S. federal reserve.

GOLD MINES RALLY
The most noticeable effect on the stock market was a rally by gold mining issues, most of which had sunk considerably below this year's highs. The highs were reached before Wall Street became convinced that there would be no change in the \$35-per-ounce price for gold.

The Dow Jones industrial average reached the closing high of 906.30 on Wednesday but closed the week at 901.57, posting a small net loss of 1.25. The Associated Press average of 60 stocks reached its latest record peak of 337.6 on Thursday but ended the week unchanged at 337.2.

to come, and facing the prospect of new increases in employment and other costs—must conclude the profit squeeze is still with them," commented Editor Walter J. Campbell. The publication said earnings reports for 15 of the leading steel-makers in the U.S. showed sales and profits rose above 1963 levels in each case.

GROUP SALES GO UP
The group's sales were up 12 per cent; earnings were up 29 per cent, the metal-working weekly reported. "Return on sales climbed from 5.6 to 6.4 per cent. (The industry's rate of return in 1963 was 5.4 per cent.)"

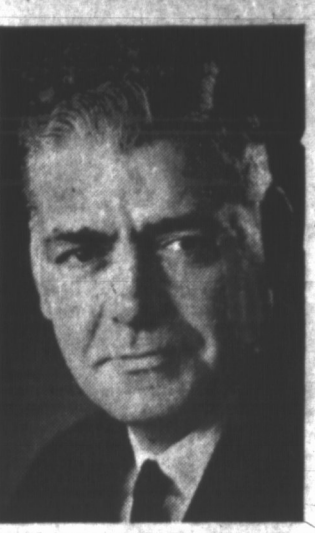
Steel said the industry's 1964 profit margin was about equal to that in 1958, continuing a "turnaround that started the year before. After profits peaked a 7.8 per cent in 1955, they slid to four per cent in 1962."

Record output, lower federal taxes, new and improved facilities and greater productivity contributed to last year's performance, the trade journal said. For some firms, it added, another factor was the application of investment tax credit reserves from 1962 and 1963 to last year's income.

The magazine said the consensus of more than 100 equipment builders contacted last week was that a solid base for a "better than an originally expected" second half for metal-working seems to be in the making. It quoted them as saying:
