

5th West Prince Flower Show Is Huge Success

The fifth West Prince Flower Show, held at Alberton yesterday afternoon and evening, was officially opened at 3 p.m. by Mr. Nell A. Matheson, M.P.

Mr. Fred C. Ramsay, M.L.A. acted as chairman. He commended Regalette Rebekah Lodge for sponsoring so fine a flower show, and commented on the progress it has shown from year to year. He spoke of flowers as an important part of creation, come from the maker's hand to make people happier and add to the pleasure of surroundings in home and hospital. Their beauty gives one a feeling of nearness to the creator.

Mr. Matheson congratulated those who had been responsible for arranging the flower show and referred to the evident fact that much work had been involved. He reminded his hearers that there had been a time when flowers did not belong to all. "We are told that in medieval times flowers were grown only behind monastery walls. The Dutch and Flemish were responsible for bringing flowers to people like us."

Dr. Phillips extended congratulations to those who had organized the flower show, to all the prize winners and exhibitors who had shared the beauty of their flowers. Brievely he reviewed the history of gardens, referring to the beautiful hanging gardens of Babylon which were the most famous of ancient times, to those of the Greeks, Romans, Italians and Dutch through whom the custom of growing flowers was brought to England. In Canada the first botanical garden was at Halifax.

Flowers have many uses. From them we derive most of our colors and patterns. Poets and painters have been inspired by them. They are used in medicines and perfumes, to beautify homes and churches, to comfort the sick and shut-ins.

He made reference to the improvement made through the rural beautification program and suggested that much more could be accomplished by cutting or spraying weeds along the roadsides, by further improving school grounds and cemeteries.

Dr. Dewar referred to the important part flowers play at many occasions in life. A philosopher once said that the beauty of flowers is a bond between nature and the soul. Shows like this, he said, make one realize how much beauty there is in nature. He congratulated those who through effort and work planned the show and made it such a success.

As in the afternoon refreshments were served by members of Regalette Lodge. Mrs. Wesley Hardy and Mrs. Clayton Travers poured. Members of the lodge appreciate the work and contribution of exhibitors and all others who participated in making the flower show so successful.

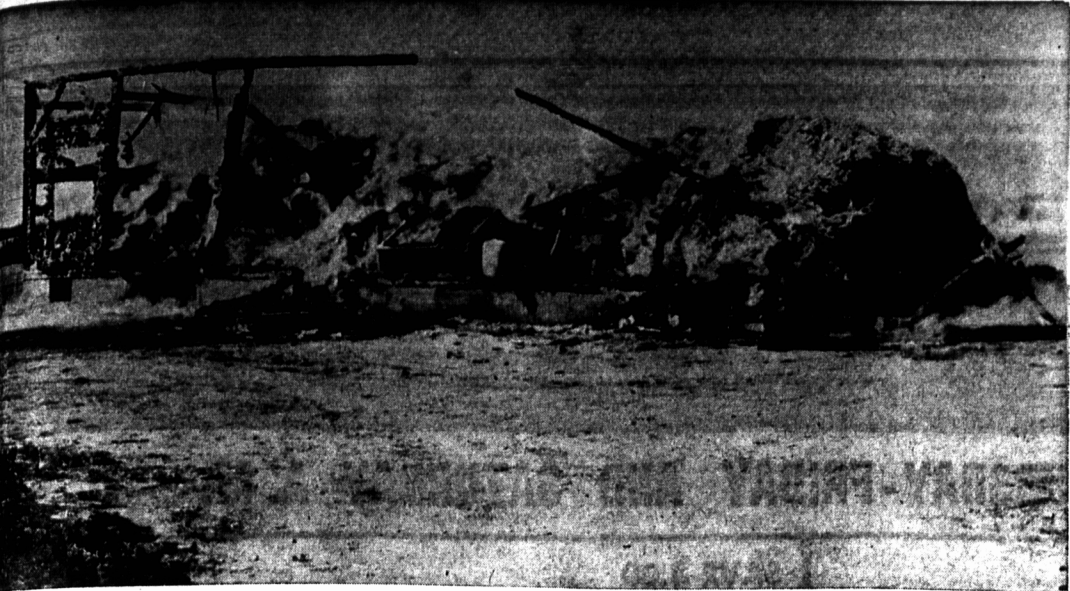

machinery saved from the buildings. However, a second tractor was lost in the fire, as was a plow, potato planter, grain crusher, 1,000 feet of matched boards, 2,000 potato bags, 10 rolls of barbed wire, tools, wrenches, and many other items.

Also lost in the main barn was a lot full of hay, an electric water pumping system, and the fixtures of the newly remodelled barn which was equipped with steel stanchions, water bowls, and facilities for housing up 30 head of cattle.

Both the barn, measuring 65 x 26 with an additional and shed,

measuring 36 x 22, were newly constructed, with cement foundations, and a cement floor in the barn. Efforts of neighbors who quickly gathered, soon had fire extinguishers, tractor driven sprayers, and water tanks, spraying Mr. Parker's nearby house and saving it from destruction by fire.

Their efforts also extinguished a fire on the roof of a shed at the home of Hudson Lowther, across the highway and some distance from the burning barn from which sparks had been carried by the gentle breeze prevailing at the time.
