

Owner Told To Remove Car From Harbor Floor

A 1959 model car owned by Robert Nelson, 13 Spring Park Road, was reported driven off the end of the Railway Wharf in Charlottetown at approximately 3 a.m. Friday by two unidentified persons. The owner of the car was said to be unaware of the happening until he was notified by the Charlottetown Police force to have his automobile removed from the water at the wharf.

Harold Harrington, a quartermaster on the Kingdoc ship anchored at the wharf, was an eye witness to the incident. Mr. Harrington was up on deck attempting to get a ball game on the radio when he noticed a car speeding around the wharf in circles. He said that after making a couple of trips around the wharf, the car headed straight over the end of the wharf and then the automobile was out of sight.

Mr. Harrington said: "There was one person running beside the car as it went up the end of the wharf and then when the car went over I saw two people running away from the scene. I think someone must have had his foot on the gas pedal as the car was going at quite a clip."

and Robert Crockett arrived on the scene at approximately 3.40 a.m.

The police then notified Avin Andrews, a diver who resides in Charlottetown and Mr. Andrews began looking for the automobile at daylight yesterday morning. The car was located at approximately 1.30 p.m. yesterday and was pulled from the water by a two-truck from a service station in Charlottetown.

A member of the police force said he thought the car had been stolen and driven over the wharf, but the police had nothing official to report last night.

Pearson To Visit City October 16

Two Wind Up In Hospital

Two people were hospitalized last evening when a car left the road at the intersection of the Exhibition Drive and Riverside Drive in Parkdale.

The car, a 1962 convertible, was described by an observer as a total wreck.

Three people escaped serious injury later in the evening when a small car driven by Newman White of Georgetown left the Trans-Canada Highway at Mt. Albion. No one was seriously injured but the car suffered extensive damage.

A spokesman for Maritime Electric said the blow-out was caused by the wet weather and that the delay in restoring the power was due to the search for the troublesome fuse.

HALEFAX (CP) — The weather office says strong southerly winds and intermittent rain were being reported from most localities in the Maritimes late Friday evening.

Drier air entering southern Quebec will push rapidly across the district today, with the rain ending over all except Cape Breton Island by early afternoon. Skies will be slow to clear in all regions.

A weak disturbance over Manitoba will spread cloud to western New Brunswick early Sunday with all except Cape Breton Island expected to be cloudy by Sunday evening. Temperatures Sunday should be near the 40-degree mark in all three provinces.

Montague Local Hears Noted Educationalist

Approximately 120 teachers were present at the fall convention of the Montague Local of the Prince Edward Island Teachers' Federation held at Montague yesterday.

The following committees were appointed: press: Evelyn MacLure, Jacqueline Christian, recommendations: Willard McCarron, Mrs. Donald MacKenzie, Mrs. Pat Doucette; nominations: Mrs. Mudina MacLean, Mrs. Howlett, Mrs. Carmina MacRae.

Following the reading of the minutes of the previous meeting by the secretary Mrs. Stanley Burke, the teachers were welcomed by the president, Mr. Robert Stead. In a brief address Mr. Stead outlined the activities of the local during the year, and stressed the need for professionalism among teachers. He urged the teachers to make more use of their organization.

SUPERVISOR'S REPORT

The supervisor's report was given by Mr. Harold Hynes, on behalf of Louis Herring, who was unable to be present. After speaking on consolidation and grade eight results, he gave an address on the qualities of a good teacher. He pointed out the need not only for the conveying of factual information, but for challenging the student to be curious and creative. A partnership between parents and teacher is necessary for achieving these ends, he said.

Mrs. W. W. Reid, director of Junior Red Cross, spoke briefly and introduced George Mitchell, a Mt. Stewart student, who attended a Red Cross leadership conference at the Grove City Training Centre, Pennsylvania, during the summer. He gave an account of the benefits he received from this conference, emphasizing the realization that this course brought to him of the important work the Red Cross can do.

A highlight of the morning session was a brief address by Dr. Stewart McIntosh, director of education for the city of Glasgow, Scotland. Dr. McIntosh is visiting the province as part of a tour of Canada. He was introduced by Dr. Kenneth Parker. In his address Dr. McIntosh spoke of teacher training and education in Scotland and mentioned the need for constant revising and improving of educational programs.

At the conclusion of the morning programme films on the new mathematics were shown to mathematics teachers while high school teachers were given the opportunity of discussion, their problems with Wilson Ross, superintendent of high schools.

During the afternoon session the following elections to the board of governors of the provincial federation were made: Mrs. John Yeo, Mrs. Elsie Waterworth, Donald MacKenzie, Mrs. Helen Robbins and Herman Connolly.

Miss Anna Riley, general secretary of the P.E.I. T.F., outlined the year's activities and thanked all teachers for their cooperation.

Mr. J. A. S. Williams, director of curriculum gave a report on teacher licensing and changes in the curriculum.

The following slate of officers for the year was adopted: president: Herman Connolly; vice-president: Mrs. Ina Hickox; secretary: Mrs. Lija Smith.

Military Exercise Set For Weekend

Through the courtesy of Canadian Army intelligence, the Prince Edward Island Regiment has been informed that a small enemy force will land in this province sometime during the weekend, and the P.E.I.R. will take appropriate action.

The report states the enemy will land from a fleet of fishing trawlers in the Point Prim area, probably shortly after dawn on Sunday, and the local regiment will be deployed in a reconnaissance role to make contact with the invaders.

All three squadrons of the regiment, located at Charlottetown, Summerside, and Montague will be mobilized for action. Troops from Montague and Summerside will leave their own armories at 1.30 this afternoon, and members of the city squadron will leave from Queen Charlotte Armoury at the same hour.

On arrival in the Camp Buchan area this afternoon, the troops will brush up with lectures and drills until supper, at 5 p.m., and a sports program and films will keep them busy until lights out.

Early on Sunday morning, they will attend church services and breakfast in the field before going into battle. And if things go according to schedule, the enemy should be rounded up in time for dinner at 1 p.m.

Lt. Col. E. G. MacLeod, M.C. will command the P.E.I. Regiment during the operation, with Major J. E. Ready as second-in-command.

Major E. G. Kerr will be in command of the enemy forces. During the two-day operation, the regiment will be completely self-sustaining, providing meals and sleeping accommodations in the field.

Plea Of Guilty Nets \$100 Fine

James MacGuigan of Oceanview was fined \$100 and costs of 10 days by Magistrate James B. Johnson, Q.C. in Queens County Magistrate Court yesterday, when he pleaded guilty to a charge of impaired driving.
