Col. Macpherson's History of Sir John.

On the 8th at the Russell House, Ottawa, Mr. W. Earle, of the Earle Publishing House, St. John, N. B., completed arrangements with Col. J. Pennington Macpherson, A. D. C., for the prompt publication of his biography of the late Sir John A. Macdonald. The Colonel is a nephew of the late Premier.

Horse Notes.

It was a great day for the Lamberts at Hartford, on the 23rd inst. Leighton Chief, by Aristos, 2.27 1/2, son of Daniel Lambert, beat a good field of blue bloods in the 2.40 class, trotting, getting a record of 2.30, and Dynamite, by Ben Franklin, 2.29, another son of Daniel Lambert, led the fashionably-bred ones to the wire in the 2.24 class. —It is said that nickel ore to the value of \$1,500,000 was shipped the other day from Sudbury, that the freight charges of the C. P. R. rone were \$30,000, and that 13 or 14 carloads of metal are leaving there every day. If this is the case there must soon be a development in the nickel industry which will place in the shade the many "booms" of our neighbors to the south. Referring to British investment in the States, the Manchester Evening News said some months ago that the "capital" could be still better applied to work the mineral and other resources of Canada. The stimulus thus given to industry would result in an enormous influx of population." The Birmingham Gazette added that there was "a cheery prospect none the less for Canada, which, if expectation be realized, will have cause to look upon the region of Sudbury as a veritable Eldorado."

After the appropriation of \$1,000,000 at the last session of Congress for the purchase of nickel the United States Government sent commissioners to investigate our supply, and these gentlemen reported that: "We are fully convinced from surface indications and the shafts already sunk that they have an amount of mineral which cannot be exhausted by this generation." They estimated, indeed, that the amount of ore above the surface of the ground in the deposits seen by them reached 650,000,000 tons.

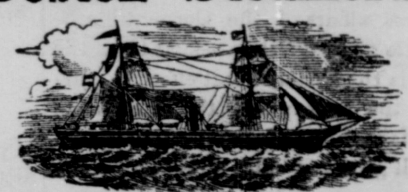
