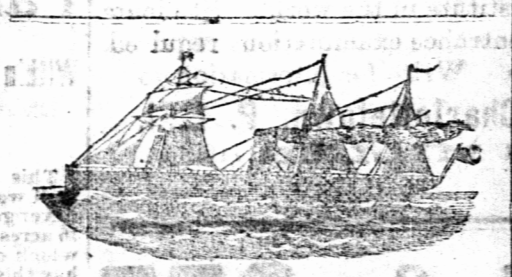
PICTOU ELECTS ONE CONSERVATIVE.

THE COLUMBIA IS SUCCESSFUL

Outsailing the Shamrock, She Won by the Time Allowance Yesterday

15 SECONDS AHEAD STARTING, BEHIND AT END

Race Begun With an 18 Knots Breeze Which Fell Off at Close—Shamrock Overtook and Passed Her Rival and Led to the Finish—The Cup Will Stay in America.

SHAMROCK AHEAD BUT LOST THE RACE.
NEW YORK, Oct. 4.—(Special).—The cup stays in America! The Shamrock crossed the finish line ahead, out-sailing the Columbia in today's great race, but lost on time allowance.

COLUMBIA STARTED AHEAD.
The Columbia crossed the starting line 15 seconds in the lead, but both were behind the handicap gun and so the time of starting was given officially as 10:02 for each boat.

SHAMROCK OVERTAKES HER RIVAL.
The Shamrock soon overhauled the Columbia, the course being free over 15

miles with an 18 knot wind from the north west.

SHAMROCK TURNED FIRST.
The yachts turned as follows: The Shamrock at 12:49:40; the Columbia at 12:49:35.

COLUMBIA AGAIN LEADING.
The Columbia took the lead and seemed a sure winner, as for a time she continued to increase her distance in the dead beat home.

SHAMROCK LEADS AT THE FINISH.
Then the wind fell off and the Shamrock began huffing up, passed the Columbia and led to the finish, but not by enough to win out.

BIG MILLINERY OPENING

An Excellent Display And Large Attendance At Perkins' Millinery Room.

One of the most attractive Millinery openings ever held in Charlottetown took place on Thursday and was that at Messrs F. Perkins & Co's show rooms, which were thronged all day with a large crowd of ladies. Many warm words of praise of the beautiful collection of artistic hats and bonnets which were attractively displayed were heard on every hand. The show room was prettily decorated, the manner in which the exhibition was made adding greatly to the enjoyment of the visitors. The hats are certainly very natty and serviceable. There is an endless variety of pretty wings, plumes and braids, the show cases being filled with the most magnificent productions of millinery art. The arrangements were complete and Miss Mutch is certainly deserving of the praises heard on all sides. Braids, wings, quills, rhine stones, gun metal, and other ornaments are very much in evidence and there was scarcely a hat that had not an ornament of some kind. Fanne velvet and real lace has come in as a novelty this year, and promises to be much worn. The pleasant tones are the leading features of the season. A particularly handsome one was in red and black, a band of braids was knotted over the front brim and the tail feathers, formed the scarf end effect at the back. A dainty lot of Dresden ribbon was prettily displayed amid a bower of hand-made laces which attracted much attention. The styles are numerous. Much admired were two pretty hats one a black picture hat, trimmed off the face, faced underneath with Ghentille and Sequine, crown shirred with black taffeta and velvet, with three ostrich plumes falling over the front. The other is a white hat turned a little on one side, with underbrim of white taffeta ruffles, draped with spangled net with a white bird and loops of black velvet ribbon at the back. To only mention millinery would not give an idea of all the new goods for autumn which seem as a matter of course to go with the millinery opening. Especially noticeable was a beautiful seal coat with mink collar which is one of the best in fit and finish ever exhibited by that firm.
